WHAT IS THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET?

Too often the municipal budget is construed as merely another document inspired by the first of March, adopted by the first of July, rescued by the third of November when the first tax installments come in, and retired by the thirtieth of June. Lewis Carroll of "Alice in Wonderland" fame is once reputed to have subtly defined a budget as a "midget which grewlarger and larger until it became a budget."

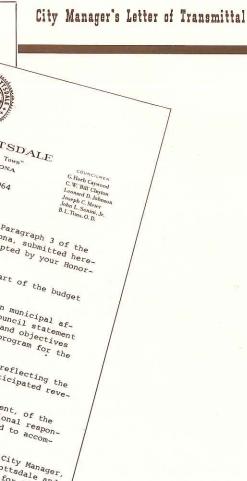
Actually, the annual municipal budget is a living document which translates human energies into human objectives. More specifically, it is a plan -- a financial transliteration of community goals. Or as one writer has suggested: "It is the City's work program with a dollar sign in front of it." Historically, the word "budget" though obscure in its origin, is probably derived from the Middle English bouget, meaning bag or wallet; it presumably applied to a leather bag in which the King's Chancellor of the Exchequer carried documents explaining the country's needs and resources.

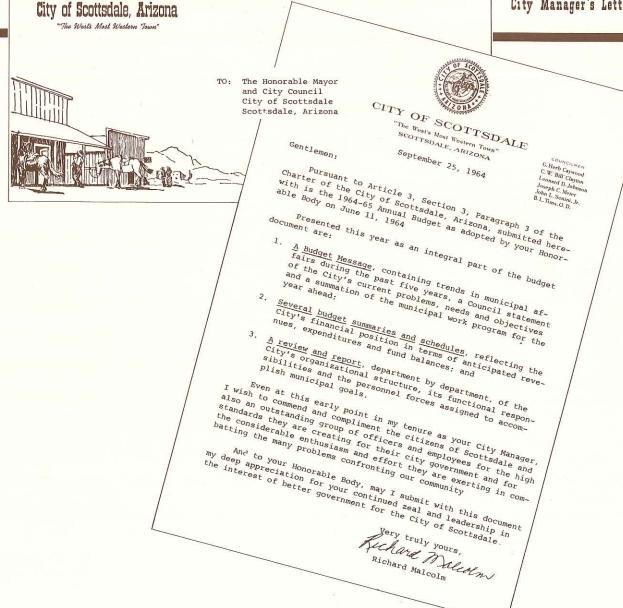
Notwithstanding its essential character as a midget, a living document, a financial plan or a leather bag, no official city document is of greater importance to the welfare of the City of Scottsdale. Within its covers is represented the City's intended municipal standard of living. This homely document, which unfortunately is unread by or unfamiliar to nine out of ten Scottsdalians, can, through its intrinsic ambivalent nature, mean the difference between: (1) kids playing kick-the-can in the streets or a well-organized, properly supervised recreation program on our parks and playgrounds: (2) higher crime and fire rates or effective around-theclock protection of your family and property 365 days a year; (3) a catch-as-catch-can refuse collection service or an efficient, mechanically up-to-date refuse system which enhances not only the public health and sanitation, but also the scenic qualities of our community; (4) narrow, congested, unkempt streets or broad, wellpaved, beautifully landscaped avenues permitting safe passage for the City's 20,000 or more motor vehicles.

In a word, the municipal budget represents the people's hopes for a better community, the City Council's "book of the day, month and year" for realizing those hopes, and the "management Bible" for objectifying them. Aside from the more prosaic passages that characterize every number-spangled document, it truly has its adventurous overtones. In one sense, it represents an action-packed human drama that no Hollywood screen writer could portray in his greatest fiction; yet, it is as <u>real</u> as a new park or street sweeper, as <u>real</u> as a new refuse truck, as <u>real</u> as the people who do the work and the people who are served by its purposes --

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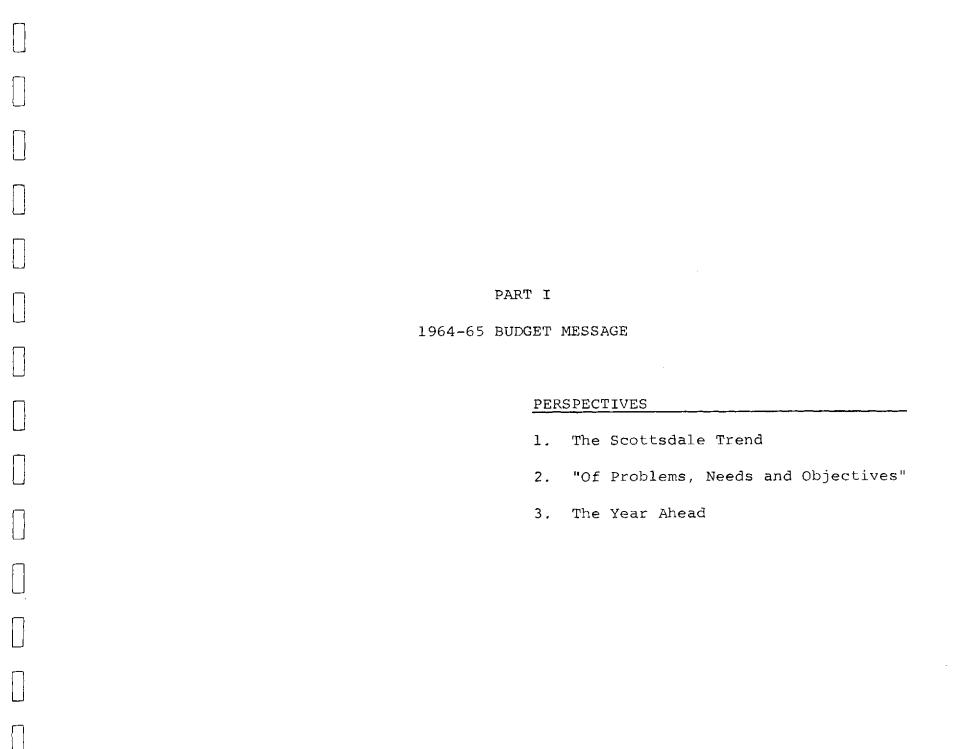
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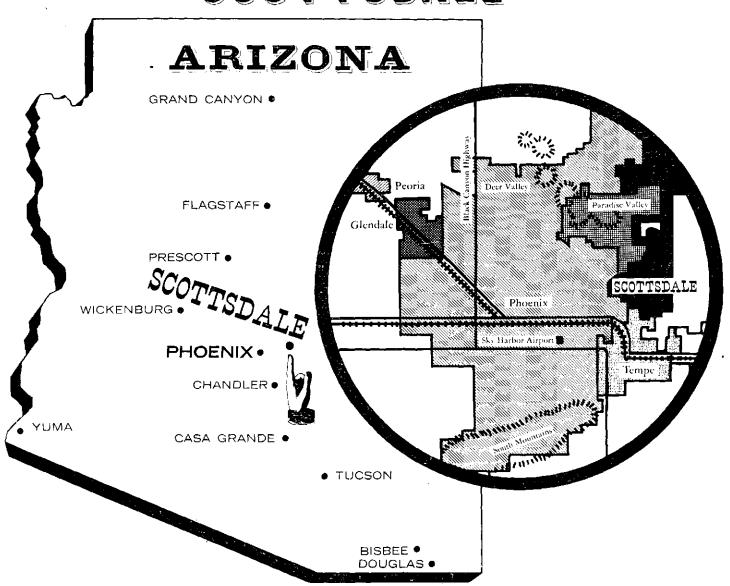
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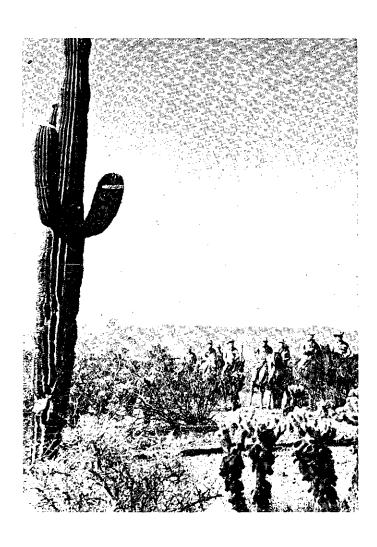

THE CITY

The Town of Scottsdale was incorporated on June 25, 1951, with an area of .62 acres and a population of 2,032. Scottsdale was incorporated as "The West's Most Western Town" and that inscription is carried on the city seal. It retains its own home-rule charter, adopted in 1961, and operates under the Council-Manager form of government.

From its beginnings, Scottsdale has grown to an area of approximately 66 square miles and an estimated population of 45,000; its plans are geared to a city ultimately approaching 200,000 population. This startling growth has occurred in the brief period of 13 years. Scottsdale has crossed many bridges in that interval. For example, a comprehensive zoning ordinance has been adopted; subdivision control is exercised; police, fire, and the normal range of municipal services are offered to the citizens of Scottsdale. Scottsdale is a good place to live.

THE NEW AND THE OLD

As a high quality residential community in the Phoenix metropolitan complex of cities, Scottsdale retains ready access to all modern services and conveniences. Many residents are employed in local commerce and industry and that of surrounding communities. The commercial sector, Old Scottsdale, emphasizes the traditional aspects of the Far West, and includes a large number of specialty shops serving a rich and thriving residential and tourist market. We are served by a fully modern public school system, 30 churches of various denominations, and three hospitals, as well as our own public library, two newspapers and other extensive communicative media. Scottsdale is the winter training home of the Boston Red Sox and the city offers many attractions to visitors and tourists the year around.

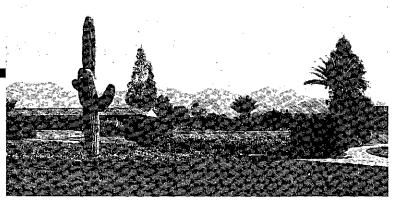
THE PEOPLE

But Scottsdale is really something more than a city -- it is a way of life. 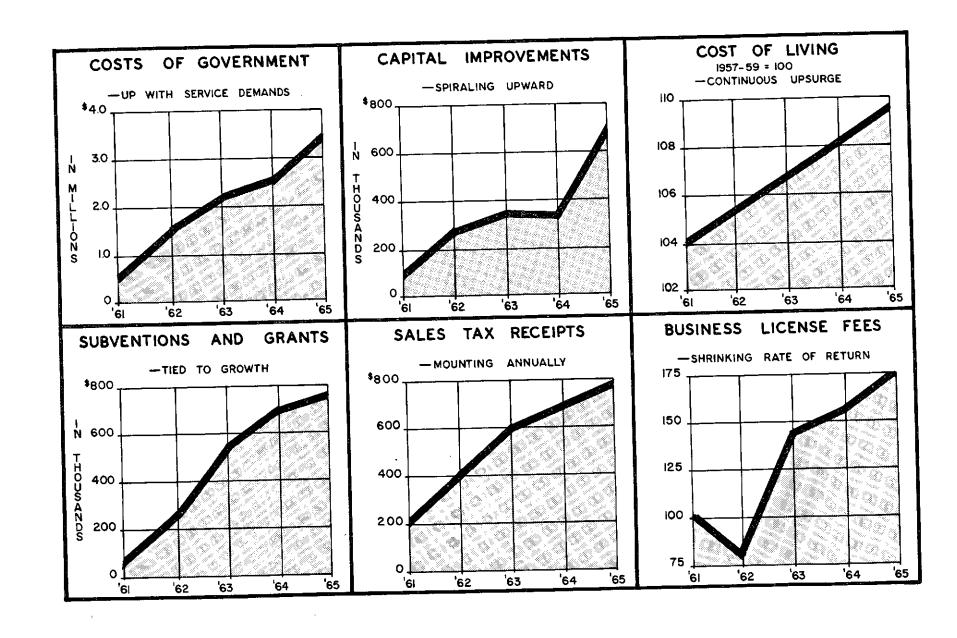
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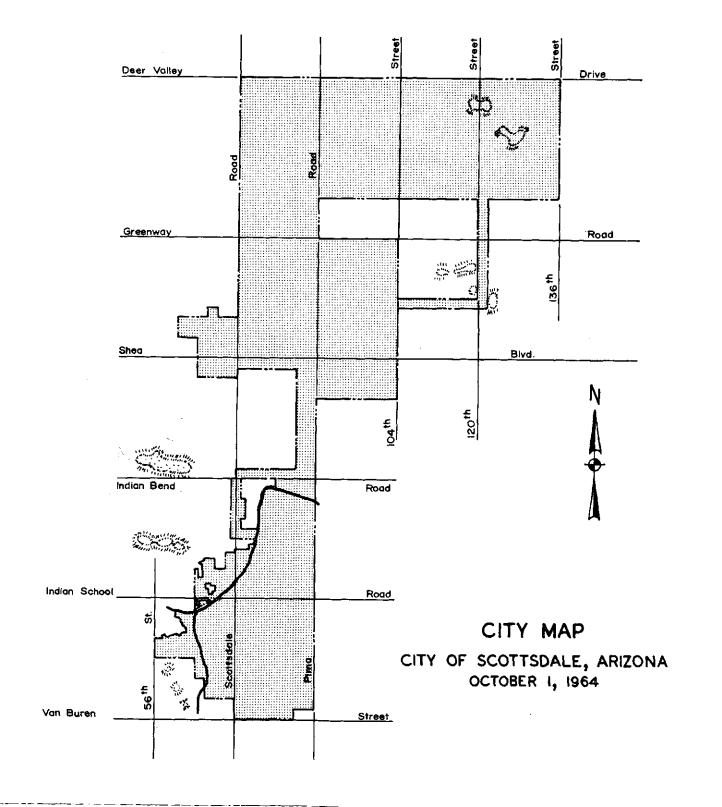
1. The Scottsdale Trend

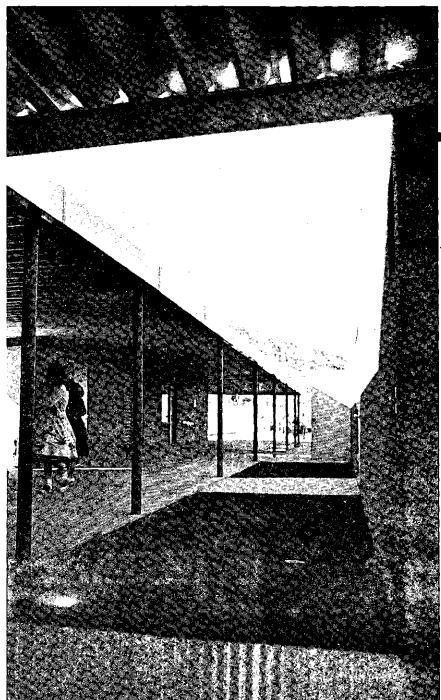
The magnitude of such changes has been fantastic. Since 1960, only a few short years ago --

- -- Our population has increased five-fold;
- -- Our construction activity has continued at a breakneck pace, far ahead of most jurisdictions in the State and averaging in excess of \$15 million a year;
- -- Our assessed property valuations have jumped seven-fold;
- -- Our property tax rate has leveled off at \$1.07, a comparatively low figure in light of the fact that the City receives less than nine cents of every property tax dollar paid;
- -- Property tax receipts have climbed eleven-fold and governmental costs which have risen steadily will property continue to do so with growth;
- -- Capital outlays are unprecedented in the City's history, have increased six-fold since 1960.
- -- Cost of living figures are edging upward -- at the rate of one or two per cent per year;
- -- State-shared subventions and grants have continued to mount nearly 1000 per cent;
- -- Sales tax receipts are up six times over, representing annual sales volumes approaching \$80 million; none the less returns from business license fees and permits, though increasing, are increasing at a regressive rate.









Bewildering growth has obviously keynoted the recent Scottsdale Trend. Not too long ago, Scottsdale was a quiet, little town, surrounded on one side by bountiful citrus groves and on the other by expansive desert. Today, Scottsdale within the short span of a decade has grown twenty-fold. And its City government is planning for a population of 150,000 (or more) in an area of 75 square miles. Our paramount task will be to guide our growth and change, for although change appears inevitable, change for a better Scottsdale will be a full-time job.

2."Of Problems, Needs and Objectives"

Toward building a better Scottsdale, the City Council has set forth what it now considers the foremost problems, needs and objectives of the community.

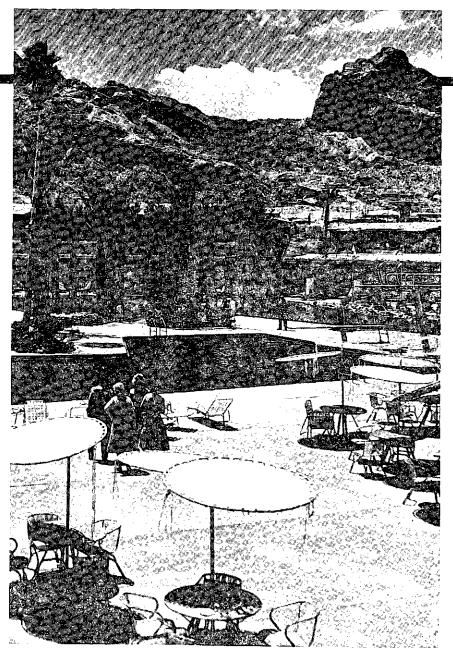
STATING THE PROBLEM

Foremost among the multiplicity of problems confronting Scottsdale, as seen by the Council, are the following:

A. Community Pride and Identity

Scottsdale's exceedingly rapid growth has brought with it thousands of newcomers representing all cross sections of life. Understandably, this has not contributed materially to social and political cohesiveness in the community. New residents, by nature, tend initially to be reticent or too busy to participate in municipal affairs or other phases of community life and, thus, fail to identify themselves readily with the City. Moreover, "Oldtimers" tend to retreat in despair and nostalgia against the overwhelming onslaught of many, new people, new and diverse ideas and new ways. To help engender greater community pride, more and better communication between City Hall and the citizenry appears warranted.

OF PROBLEMS, NEEDS AND OBJECTIVES



B. Planning for the Community

In the face of Scottsdale's intense population growth, another significant problem emerges as to "how best to guide and control the development of the community". Hence, land use -- both public and private -- along with the proper development of streets and freeways, water, parks, sewers, civic center, airport facilities, and other public improvements pose as specific problems. A further need is to extend and continue a city-wide beautification program.

C. Promoting Economic Health

High quality commercial undertakings in an increasingly healthy business environment and more garden-type industrial development appear to be necessary "to help spread the tax burden" and provide the necessary financial means to attain community goals. Corollary to the pursuit of a healthy business environment are questions, yet to be answered, as to whether pending legislation relating to signs and "high rise" will have the desired effect.

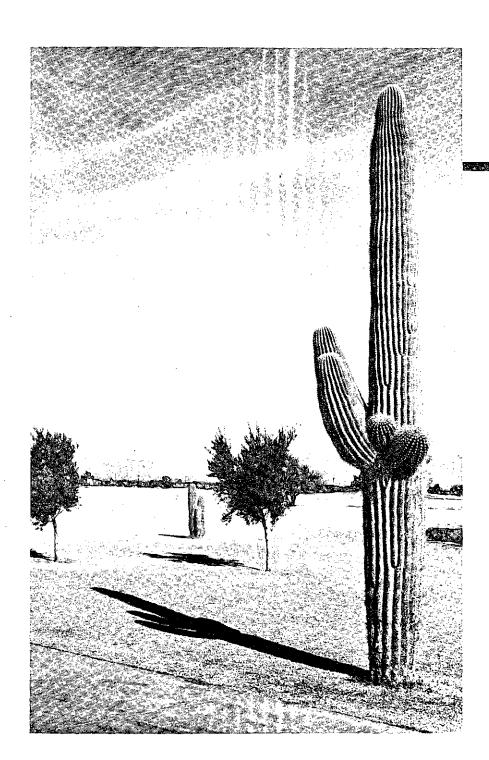
D. Other Emerging Problems

Annexed territories -- now under litigation, flood control, animal control, public sanitation, and rising adult and youth crime rates -- constitute other municipal problems demanding increased attention.

GENERAL COMMUNITY NEEDS

Paramount among the broader needs of the City are:

- A. An intensified arterial street program
- B. A comprehensive park land acquisition and development program
- C. A city-owned water system
- D. An increasingly healthy business district and
- E. An extensive, continuous, city-wide beautification program



OF PROBLEMS, NEEDS AND OBJECTIVES

Fundamental to the aforesaid needs are continuous planning and the further need to develop "a closer identification" on the part of the citizenry "with the City government". If residents are not made to feel that they are a part of Scottsdale, it will be much more difficult to foster and promote the orderly development of the community to the detriment of all. Progress through proper planning; civic action through citizen participation are essential if broader needs are to be fulfilled.

ADMINISTRATIVE AND ORGANIZATIONAL NEEDS --

Besides the pronounced desire for better communications between commissions and the Council and the Council and the people, the City's primary administrative and organizational needs may be classified under three main headings:

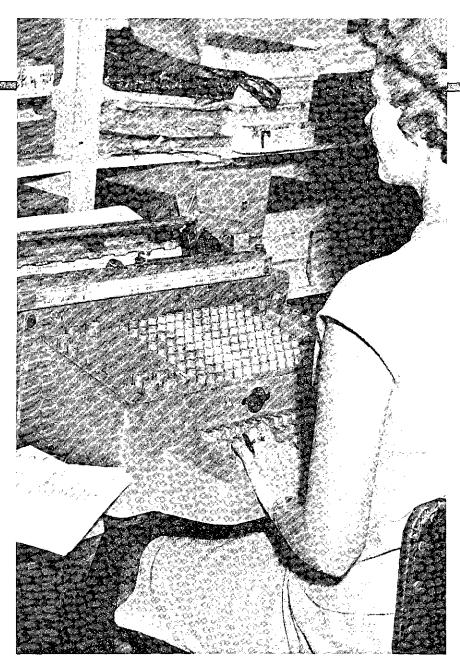
A. A New Civic Center

Civic Center facilities are urgently needed to enhance the City's capacity for performance; but, also, to provide an identifiable municipal headquarters around which citizens may rally in support of their highest hopes for this community. A City Hall-Civic Center complex should be functional and promote the aesthetic qualities befitting this community.

B. Upgrading Personnel at all Levels

City personnel should be made to feel and acknowledge that they are working for the best outfit of its kind anywhere. Increasing professionalization in the City Service can be obtained only through the recruitment, proper training, advancement and retention of the most qualified people. We must thus provide highly competitive salaries and benefits; we must insist on and get better service; and we must build a "service team" based upon the highest and best public personnel standards.

C. Better Internal Organization

The City of Scottsdale is growing fast. As municipal functions expand and become increasingly complex, new administrative needs are bound to emerge. And, if the City government is to meet those needs and render its services more effectively, the governmental organization must be continuously and appropriately adapted to conditions induced by rapid growth, change of personnel, change of leadership, changing programs and new municipal obligations.

D. OBJECTIVES

Scottsdale is on the threshold of a great, new era of growth and development. Even though much has been accomplished, not all prospects are rosy. Explosive growth and attendant municipal problems will require new solutions, shifts in program emphasis and, in some instances, onerous delays. Planning--previously conspicuous by its absence--is a case in point. The continuous establishment and enforcement of high development standards is warranted in shaping the character of the community.

Ideally, the community makeup should be a balanced one, primarily residential in nature but at once "bustling and sophisticated" in its commercial and industrial activity. Greater stress should be placed upon the development of potentially great cultural and recreational aspects. Further efforts should be exerted to retain as much of the old atmosphere in developing the new.

"We have before us a unique opportunity" to build "the most unique town in the West". An intensely interested, energetic and well-informed citizenry is the key; it can give great impetus to the development of Scottsdale "not as . . . just another City, but as a very special place in which to live, work and play".

Growing With Scottsdale...



Twelve years ago almost to the day, the Honorable Malcolm White, first Mayor of Scottsdale, climaxed a June Council meeting with a brisk rap of the gavel which gave official order and form to the City's first comprehensive budget. That budget comprised estimated expenditures of \$32,209.19.

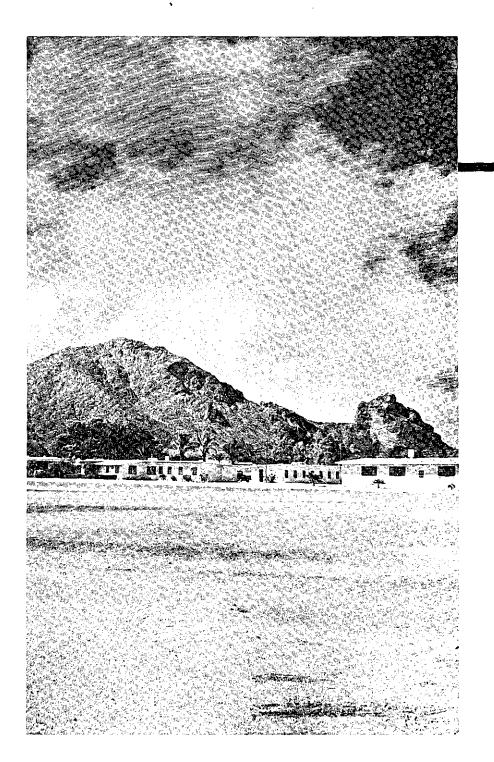
It is almost certain that neither the City's first Mayor nor any of his fellow councilmen could have foreseen by the wildest stretch of the imagination that only a decade or so later their official counterparts would be called upon (by the force of events) to adopt a municipal budget more than a hundred-fold greater in size. But, that in essence and in fact is the Scottsdale fiscal story -- a bigger city -- and a bigger budget!

3. The Year Ahead

Representing the City's pocket-book, bank-book and hole in the mattress all wrapped together in a single document, the 1964-65 Annual Budget calls for appropriations of \$3,386,219. Historically, it is the largest Scottsdale budget every adopted. But, a consolatory note should be added here. The current budget, despite its magnitude, also subscribes to what may be referred to as contemporary Micawberism, at least that side of Wilkens Micawber that advised David Copperfield on the desirability of living within one's means. Consequently, it is a balanced budget; it involves no financial deficit. And, what is more, it contemplates no increase in the municipal tax rate.

A box-score version of the budget - which appears elsewhere - indicates that this year's appropriation is higher than last year's corresponding figure by \$746,183 or 28.3 per cent. Substantial increases are reflected in the following sectors: Personal Services - \$266,343 or 26.8%; Commodities - \$111,130 or 74.9%; Capital Outlay - \$214,951 or 55.1%; Debt Service - \$216,181 or 120.7%.

Such figures bear indelible testimony to the relentless growth and development now confronting an area which may be described as one of "the most incredibly varied, productive, and dynamic" cities in the West. Once the sleepy backyard of Arizona's Valley of the Sun, today's Scottsdale has been rudely awakened by a "nightmare of numbers".

The following desiderata not only reinforce that fact; they further testify to the real forces and factors giving impact to the impending budget.

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Population Growth. Although founded at the turn of the century, Scottsdale has only recently been discovered. It's natural, cultural, commercial and residential climate along with the forces of social mobility are figuratively sending streams of people into this valley like they were played out of a high-pressured fire nozzle. In 1960, Scottsdale was a quiet, sun-splashed residential community of 10,000; by the end of this year, its population will approach 50,000. Within the next few months alone, if current projections are indicative, we will grow in population as much as the entire Scottsdale community grew during the first half-century of its existence! What is more, the growth rate is increasing progressively.

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Construction Activity. Scottsdale's dramatic population growth is reflected in other spheres - new homes, commercial development, industrial activity. In 1963-64, building valuations boomed upward to \$16.5 million; and they are expected to surge even beyond that level to \$17.5 million during the impending fiscal year.

Area Growth. Since 1960, 46.7 square miles have been added to the City of Scottsdale through annexation. Annexations involving 27.2 square miles net were consummated in 1963 alone; others are being processed or pending litigation at this writing. Scottsdale's annexation program has been motivated as much by the promotion of orderly planning and high development standards as by the "quest for bigness". Nevertheless, we are living in an era and area of "conspicuous growth and development".



GENERAL FEATURES OF THE 1964-65 BUDGET

1. Emphasis on Public Works and Improvements

To help meet the challenge of precipitous growth, the current budget lays particular stress on the public works function, including --

- A. An intensified sanitary sewer improvement program revolving primarily around the formation of the joint Five-City Sewer Project:
- B. Participation in Street Improvement Districts relating to Thomas Road, Ballpark Plaza and Winfield Scott Plaza;
- C. Extension and improvement of Camelback Road and Osborn Road;
- D. Activation and development of a comprehensive City equipment maintenance program;
- E. Establishment of a specialized right-of-way acquisition program;
- F. Broader traffic safety and street lighting services, including the installation of new traffic signals at four intersections;
- G. The resurfacing and resealing of at least seven street miles throughout the City;
- H. The installation of street name signs, City entrance markers and the painting of house numbers on curbs;
- I. Additional refuse collection equipment concomitant with community growth; and
- J. An expanded weed and pest control program.

2. Other Major Capital Improvements

Among the other salient features of the 1964-65 Annual Budget pertaining specifically to capital improvements are the following:

- A. Building expansion for Police Services and the City Court;
- B. Installation of at least 30 new fire hydrants;
- C. Acquisition of additional park lands and their development as resources provide; and
- D. Intensification of the City's tree planting and beautification program.

4. Mechanization and Modernization of Work Program

With growth—both current and contemplated—the organizational and "housekeeping" functions must keep pace if the City is to do the job expected of it. Accordingly, "retooling" in certain areas is warranted with recommended recourse to:

Data Processing Methods, to be gradually applied to all departments as resources and schedules permit;

Base-to-Field Radio Communications, equipping all key vehicles and areas with radio and recording devices to foster savings and efficiencies, especially in Public Works, Parks and Recreation as well as the Police Department;

Central Duplicating, Forms Control, Mailing and Messenger
Services, to eliminate unnecessary, overlapping work; and
Up-to-Date Equipment and new labor-saving devices as needed
in all departments.

5. Manpower Increases

The City's most valuable asset is its human resources, the working force that gets the job done. In appreciation of the City Council's recently promulgated policies and objectives, the City's personnel program is in fairly sound condition. Generally speaking, salaries are consistent with prevailing rates, but will be continuously reviewed. The Classification Plan must be restudied in the light of rapidly changing work volumes, specifications and responsibilities. The Personnel Rules warrant further examination and updating. Diversified training programs are progressing with unprecedented intensity and with great value to our employees and the City. But for the everlasting lack of space and facilities, working conditions and fringe benefits appear comparable with those of other nearby or similar jurisdictions. And employee morale is generally good.

3. Planning for the Shape of the Future

With the contemplated retention of additional professional personnel and consulting services, 1964-65 will see the full-flowering of the planning function in the City of Scottsdale. This will be climaxed with the formulation of a much-needed City Master Plan. It is also anticipated that extensive research and plans will be forthcoming in the following areas:

- A. Airport
- B. Public utilities, including water supply
- C. Parks and recreation
- D. Parkways and street trees
- E. Drainage
- F. Civic center
- G. Traffic control
- H. Central business district
- I. Photogrammetric studies
- J. Administration and organization

Government and civic affairs will also be notably enriched during the current year with the formation of a Citizens' Committee to study future capital improvement needs. Organized on a "task force" basis, the said committee will work with City officials and outside consultants to establish a broad program and guidelines for community self-improvement based on need, priority, financial feasibility and other related factors. It is anticipated that the committee will complete its studies early in 1965, in time sufficient to incorporate proposed capital improvements as an integral part of next year's budget.

Our principal deficiency, however, is the quantity of manpower itself. In spite of the great in-migration of new residents and mounting work volumes, our studies show that the number of City employees per capita hardly compares in a favorable light with other jurisdictions. Scottsdale, for example, boasts approximately four employees per 1,000 population; the City of Phoenix, by contrast, retains over eight employees per thousand. Of course, the introduction of labor-saving devices and techniques has enabled the City of Scottsdale to provide fairly high standards of service, but such measures can only be stretched so far without delimiting the City's capacity for performance.

Thus, to help foster better service, the 1964-65 Budget has provided for the retention of additional personnel, distributed among many understaffed departments as follows:

Office of City Attorney. One Clerk-Typist.

Planning and Zoning Division. One Associate Planner and one Planning Aide.

Engineering Division. One Engineering Aide II.

Equipment Maintenance Division. Two Automotive Servicemen Building Inspection Division. One General Inspector and one Plans Engineer

Police Department. One Police Lieutenant, one Police Patrolman, one Parking Checker and four Radio Operators.

Parks and Recreation Department. Three Maintenance Men (along with a reduction in force of four full-time recreational personnel and a net increase of ten part-time recreational assistants).

Library. Two Librarians I and two Library Aides (offset by a staff reduction of one full-time Librarian III and three part-time Library classifications.

Summarily, throughout the entire budgetary process, every effort has been made to meet certain, significant criteria, among them:

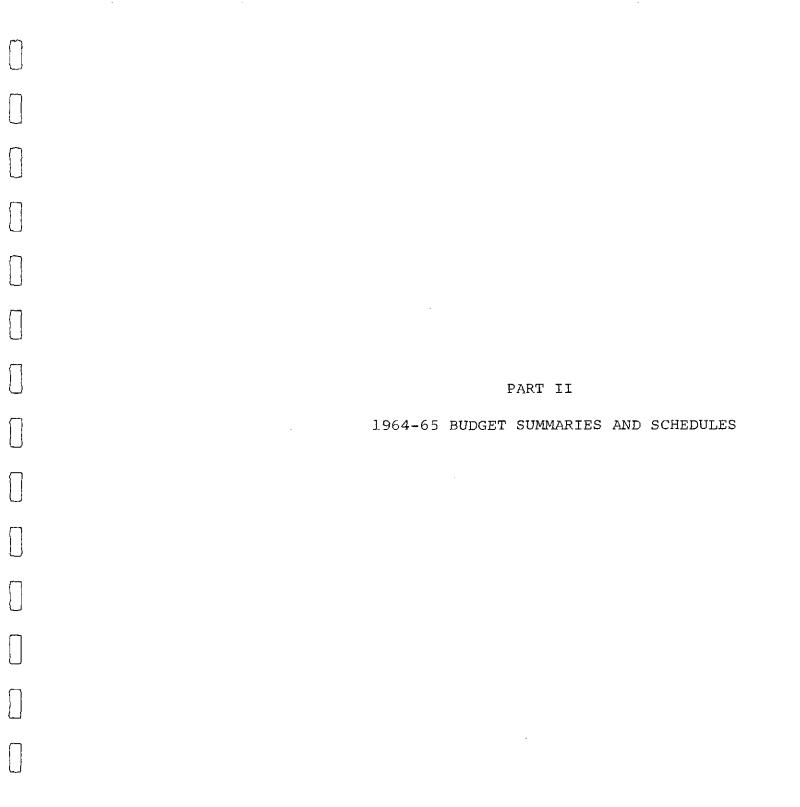


- To present a clear, comprehensive and reliable fiscal program for one of the largest enterprises in the community;
- To provide the highest standard of service within the resources available; and
- 3. To practice thrift wherever possible in government.

To be sure, a characteristic peculiar to all budgets is that they <u>limit</u> even as they <u>provide</u>. In our hearts we know that in Scottsdale larger horizons are opened up even as we cross the horizon already in sight; we know that Scottsdale's promise is staggering in its richness; we know that its people champ impatiently for better things now.

We know, too, that budgets are not magic formulae; they cannot, in all practicality, match the highest hopes, the richest promise or the demonstrated public enthusiasm in a lifetime's single year.

Even a record-breaking budget, such as Scottsdale's budget this year, can only do so much. Comprising estimated expenditures of \$3,386,219, it represents a municipal work program under which approximately 200 employees will serve an area of nearly 75 square miles and a population approaching 50,000. Twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a year, this will be no mean task. It will demand a well-planned, responsible and realistic approach to governmental operations. The 1964-65 Budget, it is felt, meets those criteria.

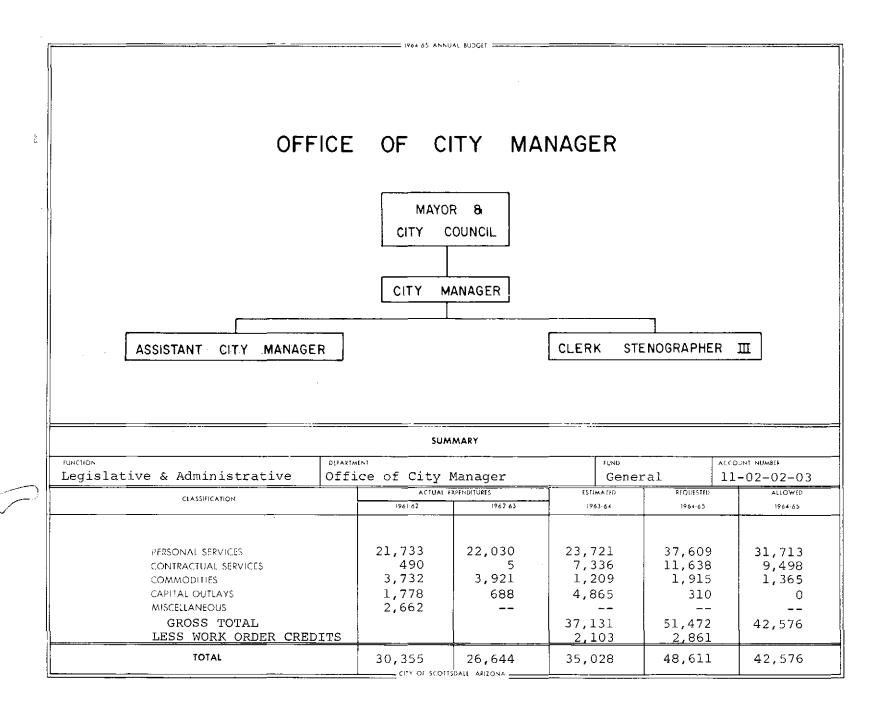
THOMAS L. COCHRAN Asst. City Manager

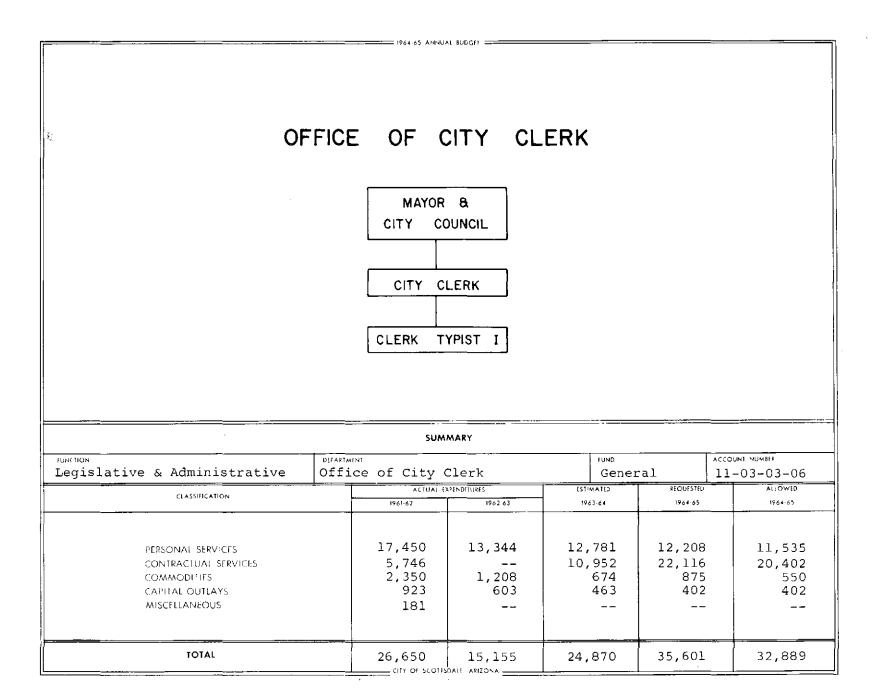

THE CITY COURT

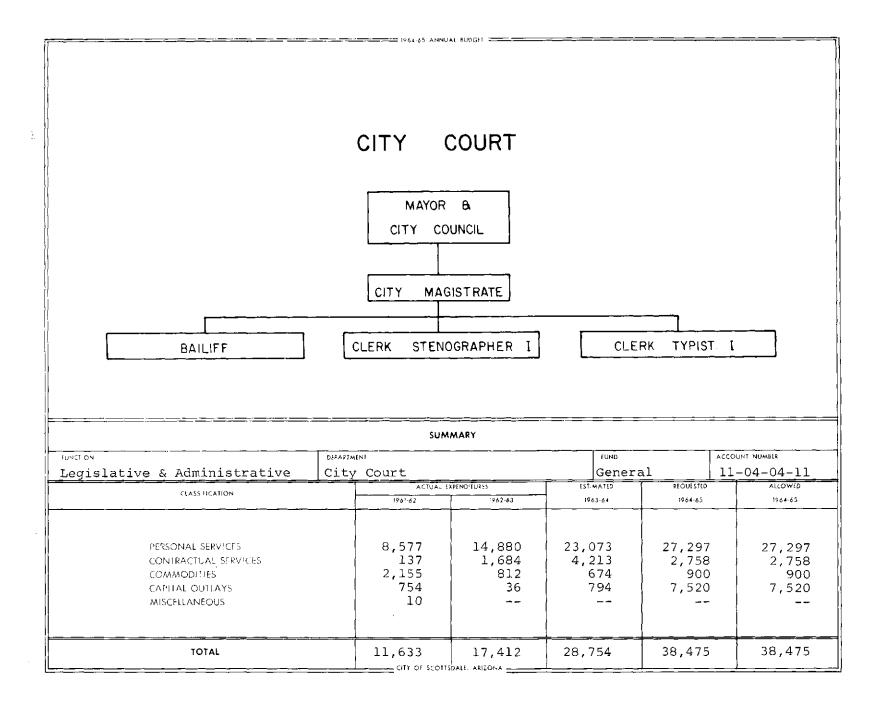
The City Court is charged with the administration of justice in the enforcement of City Ordinances and local and state traffic regulations. By Charter, The City Magistrate must be a member of the State Bar of Arizona. During the 1963-64 fiscal year, the City Court considered approximately 564 trial cases, and this number is expected to increase in the coming fiscal year. Many of these trials involve a full day or more in Court with a jury present to hear the testimony and render a verdict.

One judicial innovation accomplished during 1963-64 was the formation of a "Teen Age Jury" to judge and impose punishment on their peers who were apprehended for traffic violations by Police. During the course of the Teen Age Jury activities, an average of 56 cases were heard each month. All cases were handled by the Teen Age Jury with the City Magistrate acting as Juvenile Referee.

Court cases are expected to increase during the coming fiscal year with continued active enforcement of City Ordinances and Traffic Laws.

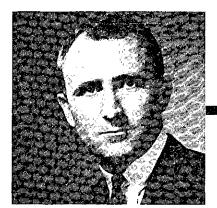

FISCAL SERVICES

Rising tax bills for the average Scottsdale property owner make it difficult to believe that for the past two years there has been no tax rate increase for City operations while local services have been greatly expanded. The answer is that certain taxes, not under control of the City, have been increased.

As the chief financial advisor to the City Manager, the Finance Director is largely responsible for seeing to it that the City operates within its resources through (1) sound fiscal planning and administration; (2) assistance in the preparation and control of the annual budget; and (3) the proper accountability of municipal funds.

In performing these responsibilities, the Finance Director retains at his disposal the services of three divisions; (1) The Accounting Division; (2) the Purchasing and Stores Division; and (3) the Data Processing Division.

The Division of Accounts records all financial transactions of the City. This Division is also

responsible for enforcement of the business and privilege license tax ordinances in addition to other miscellaneous duties. The City's books are audited annually by an independent firm of Certified Public Accountants.

In addition, the Purchasing Department is responsible for a small central store which permits all purchase of items which are easily stored.

PLANNING AND ZONING

Intelligent current and long range planning is a necessity in the growing community of Scottsdale. One of the highlights of the past fiscal year is the inception of a long range comprehensive plan, which is to be completed in approximately 24 months. In the coming year an interim short range capital improvement program will be undertaken to "tide us over" until completion of the comprehensive general plan. Perhaps the most significant advance in the planning field during the past year was the employment of a competent, experienced Planning Director to give professional guidance to the many groups concerned with community planning and development.

The Planning Commission is charged with the responsibility of recommending to the City Council in the areas of both current and long range planning. The Planning Commission considered 48 re-zoning requests during the past fiscal year. The Planning Commission is also charged with the responsibility of studying long range planning considerations and relating these studies to current planning.

The Board of Adjustment is responsible for assisting in interpretation of the Zoning Ordinance, for hearing and deciding on requests for special exceptions to the Zoning Ordinance designated as Use Permits, and to hear and decide upon requests for minor variances from the terms of the Zoning Ordinance. During 1963-64 the Board of Adjustment considered a total of 207 Use Permit and variance cases. This body is another planning arm of your local government.

The Engineering Division is composed of four sections: Design, Traffic, Right-of-Way, and Survey and Inspection. In addition, this division checks plans drawn by consulting engineers under contract to design various City projects.

A few representative statistics illustrate the activity of this division. For example, in 1963-64 a total of 29 subdivision plans were reviewed, in addition to 83 commercial building plot plans. The right-of-way section obtained 183 parcels of right-of-way for City projects. The traffic section acted upon 173 emergency calls during 1963-64. Paving permits issued for street construction in City right-of-way by private enterprise totaled 77 during the past fiscal year.

Again, it is expected that these activities, as well as the development of improvement districts and comprehensive major improvements will be expanded during the coming fiscal year.

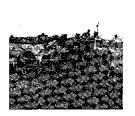
Street Maintenance Superintendent Jack Bushnell has been with the City since July, 1963. Jack is responsible for all City street maintenance work and uses extensively his long experience in the street construction and maintenance field. In addition, he is responsible for the manufacture, installation, and maintenance of all street name and traffic control signs throughout the City. The traffic line striping activity is also a part of this division.



The Street Maintenance Division consists of two sections:

The traffic control section painted a total of 118 crosswalks, as well as 81 miles of traffic control line stripes. The street name sign installation program was virtually completed with the installation of 579 new street name signs.







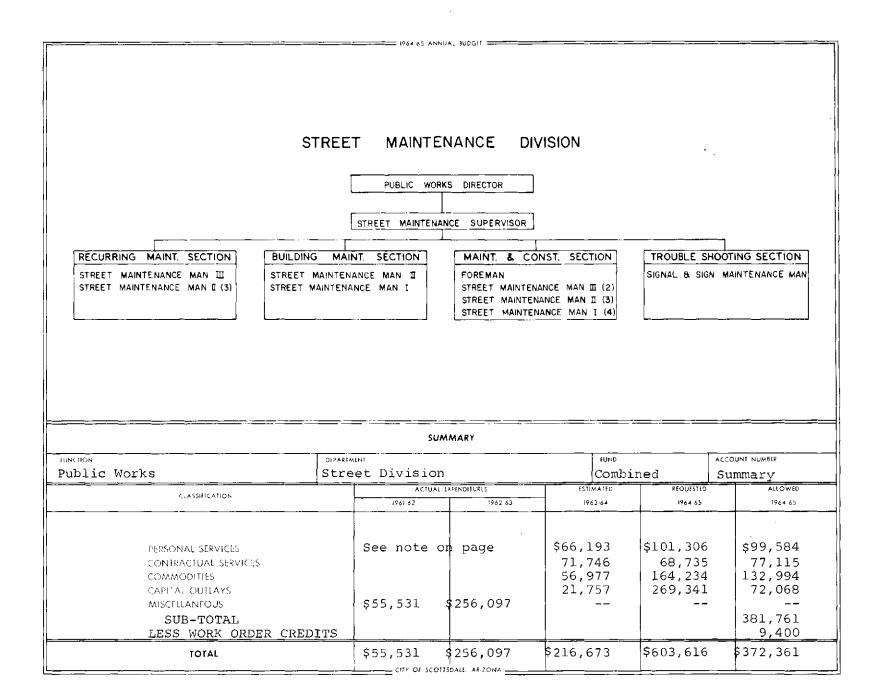

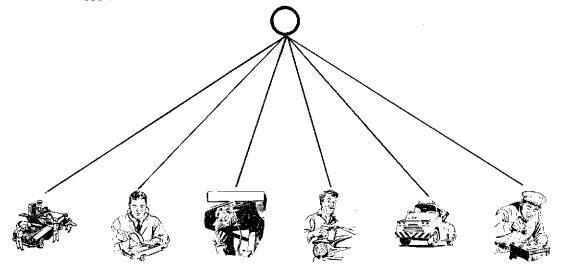
EQUIPMENT MAINTENANCE DIVISION



VIRGIL WATKINS Automotive Mechanic

Virgil Watkins, as Automotive Mechanic, is in charge of the equipment maintenance function for all City rolling stock. Virgil started with the City as a sewer maintenance maninearly 1962, and as a result of competitive examinations earned his present position in April of this year. The equipment maintenance activity has become increasingly important with the advent of City-operated refuse collection service as well as the increase of City-owned vehicles comcomitant with our growth.

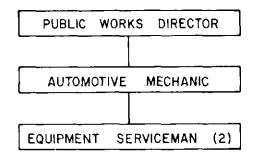
The Equipment Maintenance Division was created to service the growing fleet of automotive vehicles now operated by the City. These vehicles range from administrative cars to 30 cubic yard refuse collection vehicles to motor graders. Preventive maintenance on all City vehicles is or will be handled by this division, with major repair work being contracted to private shops which are equipped to do such work. This is a new division and, as such, is still in its formative stages. Much of this division's work is accomplished at night and on weekends when most of the City vehicles are not in use. Creation of this division is another example of an economy move to provide better service at lower cost.

THEO SCHEELE Chief Building Inspector

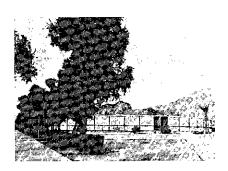

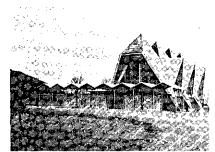
The Building Inspection Division enforces the various construction codes as well as the City Zoning Ordinance. During 1963-64, a total of 16,779 inspections were performed by personnel of this division to enforce the City's construction codes. In addition, 3,004 sign inspections were made during 1963-64 to enforce the sign provisions of the zoning ordinance. The valuation of building permits during last year totaled approximately \$16,544,000.00.

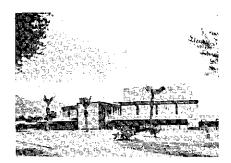
It is expected that the level of service in this division will be improved substantially during 1964-65, since the budget provides for employment of a General Inspector, who would be capable of performing all types of inspections as well as answering questions and checking complaints in the field. In addition, the position of Plans Engineer is provided in the new budget. Plans for commercial and multi-story buildings will be checked by this new member of the City staff for compliance with the various construction codes, as well as for structural soundness.

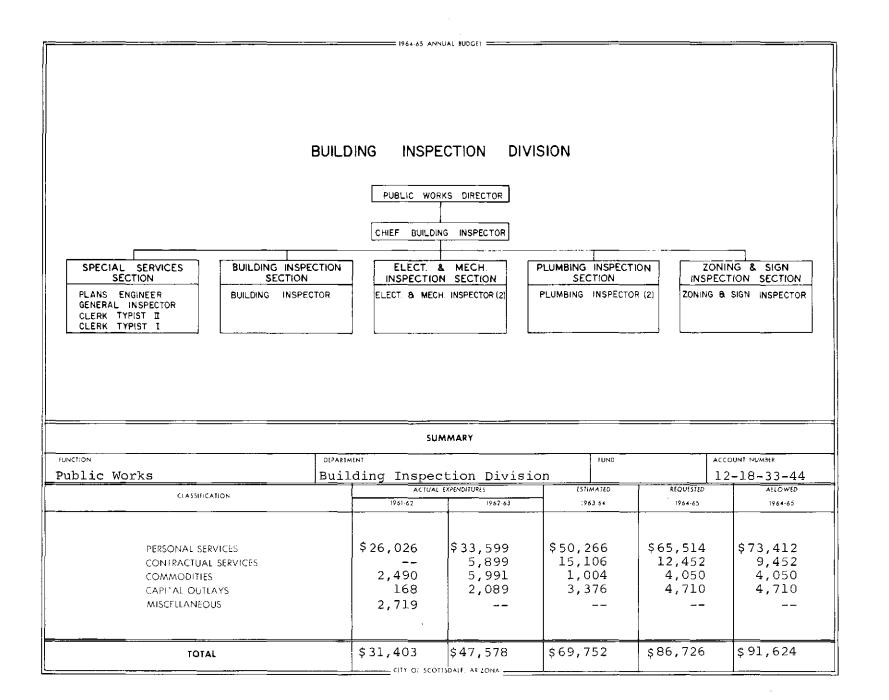
Both building activity and the level of service in this area are expected to improve considerably during the coming year.

HERMAN DEHNER Refuse Superintendent

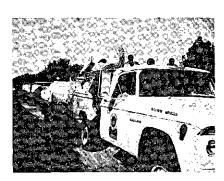
Superintendent Herman Dehner started with the City in October, 1963 as Sanitation Inspector. As a result of an examination, he was promoted to Refuse Collection Superintendent in early 1964. He had been Sanitation Inspector for the City of Phoenix for approximately 7 years prior to coming to Scottsdale. In addition to 26 Refuse Wranglers, calves, cows, and bulls, Herman and his wife are responsible for 8 children.

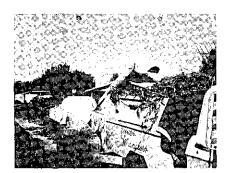
The Refuse Collection Division began municipal refuse collection service on April 8, 1964. During the time between April 8th and June 30th, the Refuse Wranglers hauled a total of 27,020 cubic yards of refuse from residential, commercial, and industrial properties inside the City.

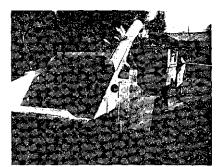
Prior to the City's initiation of its own refuse collection, a sanitation inspection program was under way. During the last fiscal year, a total of 435 litter violations in alleys and on vacant properties were reported and remedied. In addition, 519 defective refuse containers were tagged and replaced by property owners.

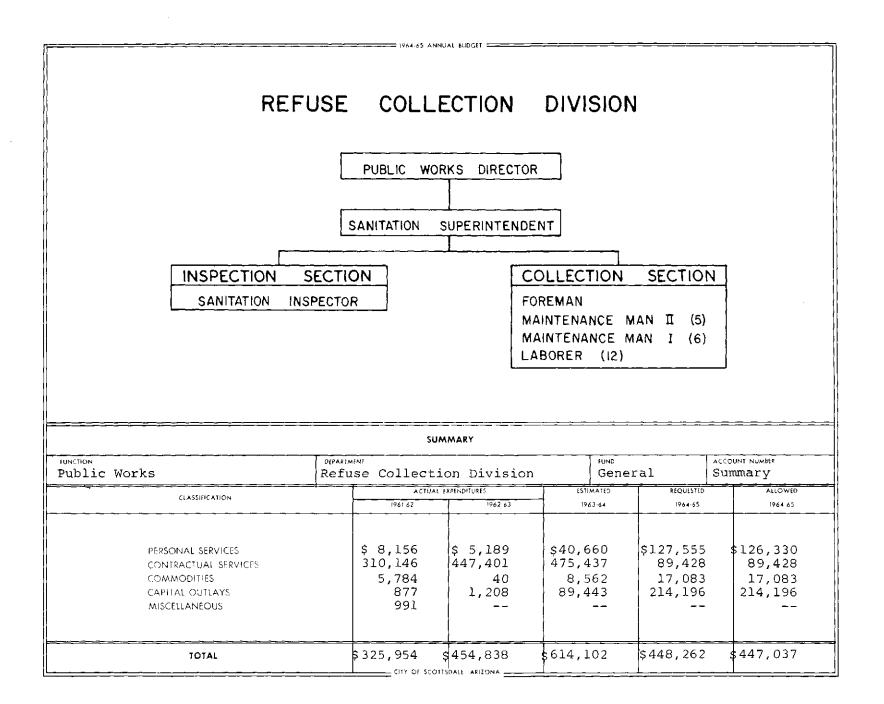
The smooth-running refuse collection system has received nationwide publicity and many compliments from residents of the City. It is expected that a brush chipper, to be purchased during the coming fiscal year, will improve the level of service in terms of removal of palm tree trimmings and other bulky refuse items.

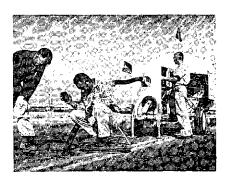


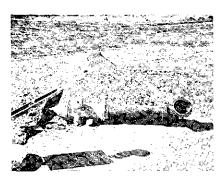
CARL OLSON Sewer Service Foreman

Carl Olson, Foreman of the Sewer Maintenance and Pest Control Division, has been in that position with the City of Scottsdale for over 7 years. and as such is an employee with one of the longest records of service with our City. Carl served with the Cities of Prescott and Mesa in similar capacities prior to his service with Scottsdale. Carl is responsible for the cleaning and maintenance of all sewer lines in the public right-of-way, as well as the City's mosquito and pest control activity.

Among the duties of this division are cleaning and repairing all sanitary sewer lines and manholes, mosquito control, and weed control. To keep sewer lines free from obstructions, a ball-type machine is used, which enabled this division to clean over 104,000 feet of sewer lines during the 1963-64 fiscal year. Acquisition of a large spray fogger during the latter part of 1963-64 has permitted the City to provide a higher level of service in the insect control field and to replace the part time unit previously provided by Maricopa County. In addition to being used for City of Scottsdale mosquito control, the unit has been loaned to other governmental agencies in order to avert potential emergency situations. With the acquisition of this labor-saving equipment, the City is able to provide a higher level of service at the same or less cost to the citizens of Scottsdale.

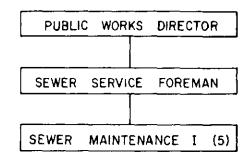

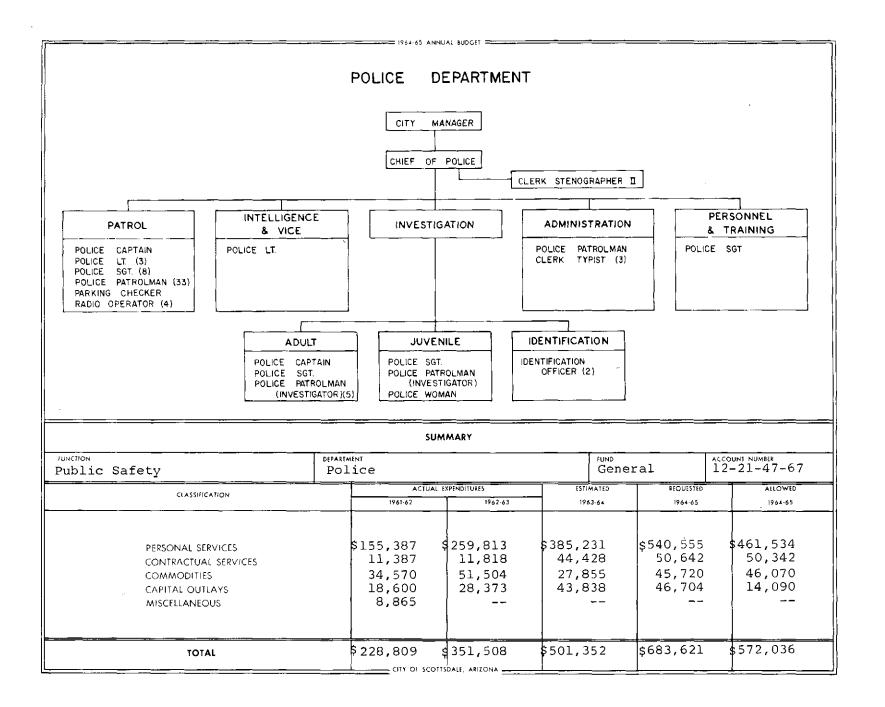
International Association of Chiefs of Police Arizona Chiefs of Police Association Pi Sigma Alpha, Public Administration Fraternity The Scottsdale Police Department initiated many changes in procedures during 1963-64 in the primary interest of simplification and efficiency. Training of all Police personnel on a continuing basis was also instituted, along with basic Police recruit training at the Phoenix Police Academy. In an effort to keep pace with the City's rapidly expanding population, sixteen new employees were added to the Police Department during 1963-64.

Part 1 - (Major) Crime increased over 1962-63, 13.8%. Arrests in the same category increased 30% over 1962-63. Cities across the country in Scottsdale's population class experienced an average increase of 20% in Part 1 crimes for the 1963-64 fiscal year over the 1962-63 year. In providing Police services and preventing crime, the department fleet was driven almost 500,000 miles

It is apparent that an increasing public awareness of the effectiveness of our Police Department and its services has contributed materially to the reduction of all violations.

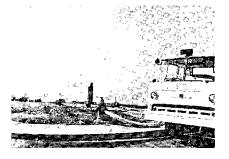
Fire services for the City are provided on a contract basis with Rural Fire Protection Company, also known as the Scottsdale Fire Department. The installation of fire hydrants, 63 of which are being installed currently, along with the Fire Department, has earned the City, in hydranted areas, a regrading by the National Board of Fire Underwriters. The N.B.F.U. evaluation of overall fire protection determines fire insurance rates paid by property owners. Hydranted areas now carry an N.B.F.U. Class 6, compared with non-hydranted areas, which carry an N.B.F.U. Classification 9. In addition to the hydrant installation program, fire hydrants are installed as part of paving improvement districts as a matter of course.

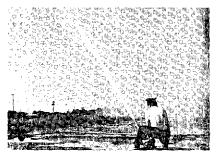
Our Fire Department, during 1963-64, experienced a 27% increase in the number of total fire alarms compared to \$75,040 or \$1.71 per capita. This compares very favorably with the national average of \$5.42 per capita.

For the 1963-64 fiscal year, the per capita cost of the City's fire protection was \$1:16, compared with a national average for cities of Scottsdale's size of \$9.01.

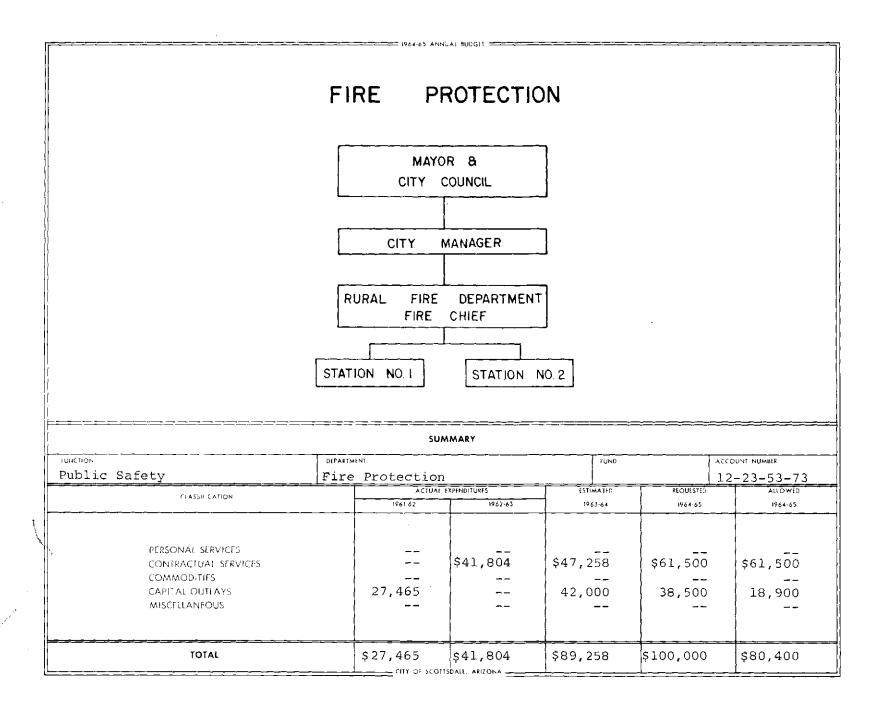
Highlights of the coming year are more intensive inspection and installation of fire hydrants in various paving improvement districts.





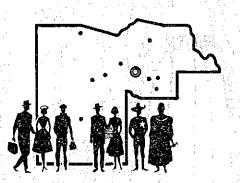






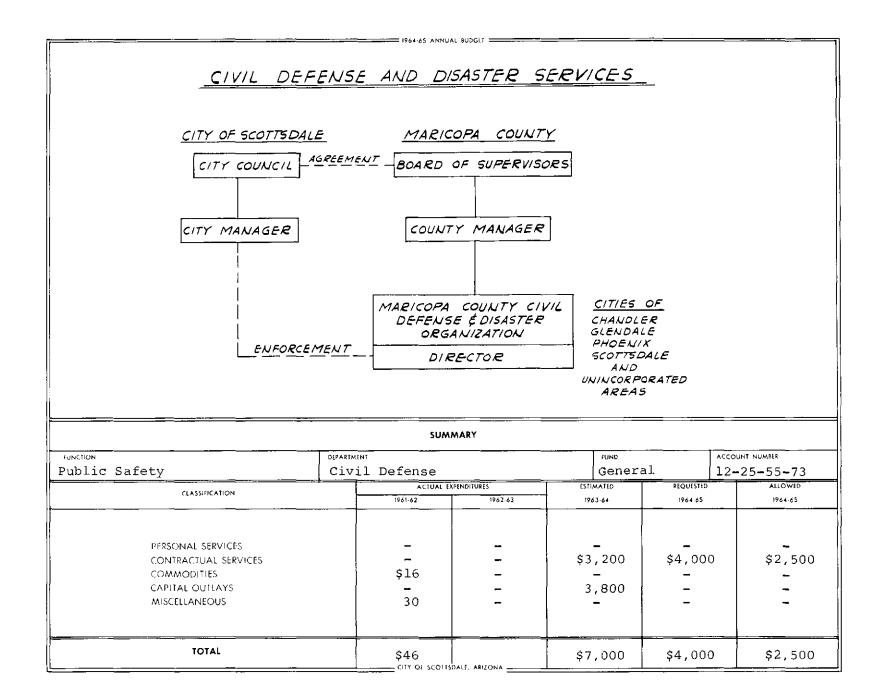
CIVIL DEFENSE SERVICES

Maricopa



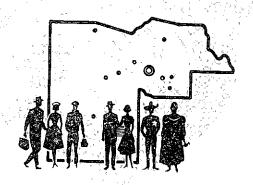
During 1963-64 fiscal year, the City Council authorized an agreement with Maricopa County for the county to provide civil defense and disaster planning services for the City of Scottsdale. Other cities which utilize the county for these services are Glendale, Chandler, and Phoenix.

Planning for manmade and natural disaster occurrences is now under way and plans for the operation of various departments during disasters are being prepared. It is hoped that through this planning process, the City will be in a position to provide smooth reaction to any disaster which may occur.



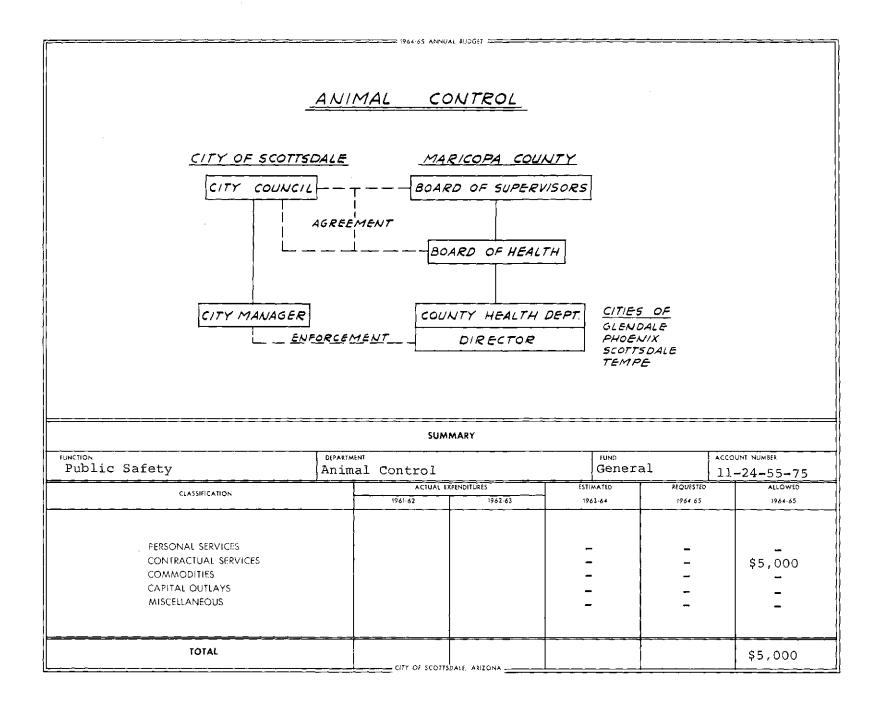
ANIMAL CONTROL SERVICES

Maricopa



During the budget preparation process, the City Council requested that the amount below be set aside for enforcement of a dog control ordinance. Such an ordinance is presently under consideration by the City Council. It is contemplated that, should the Council adopt the proposed ordinance, the Maricopa County Health Department will enforce this ordinance for the City.

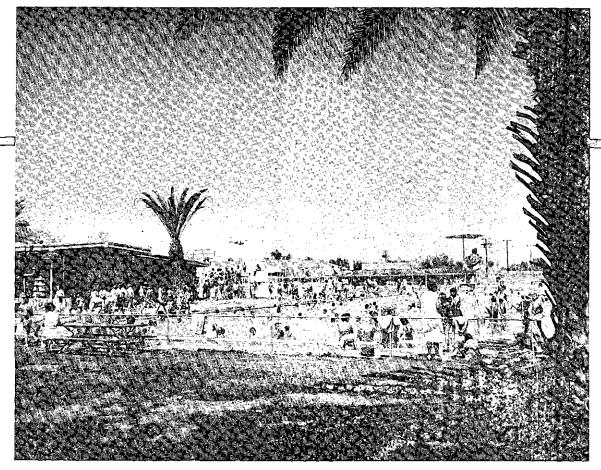
A dog control ordinance is a logical extension of the city. control program now administered on a county-wide basis by the County Health Department. The cities of Tempe, Glendale and Phoenix have already enacted such ordinances in the recent past and the County Health Department will enforce these ordinances, beginning on January 1, 1965.



SECTION 4

PARKS, RECREATION AND LIBRARY SERVICES

FUNCTION: Beautification of the City through the improvement and upkeep of public places, parks, parkways and promotion of healthful and constructive leisure-time activity for all ages through available recreational and cultural facilities.



PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT

The wide range of playground activities, city-wide sports, arts and crafts, swimming, as well as park maintenance and beautification provide leisure-time growth for the citizens of Scottsdale. Over 600,000 people participated in these diversified activities in 1963-64. A substantial increase in this number is expected during the 1964-65 year, due to increased programming and to the anticipated opening of two new five acre park sites to supplement the 12 school areas and the Community Center.

Over 1,400 people per day used the Olympic-sized pool, diving tank and wading pool, during the summer season. These swimming facilities are among the most modern public facilities in the United States, and, as is noted above, receives considerable use.

Arts and crafts activities provide leisure-time recreation for a multitude of special interest groups which range from oil painting to ceramic instruction. Courses are scheduled for the convenience of the class.

Maintenance activity includes eighteen median islands and several baseball diamonds. In addition, the Scottsdale Stadium is maintained at all times to accommodate the Boston Red Sox, the Los Angeles Angels rookie team, and local baseball teams. The Community Center grounds, and the new palm tree beautification program are also under this division's responsibility.

This department has undertaken to make the best of limited facilities and park areas by improvising and meeting many requests for service which have been heretofore unmet.

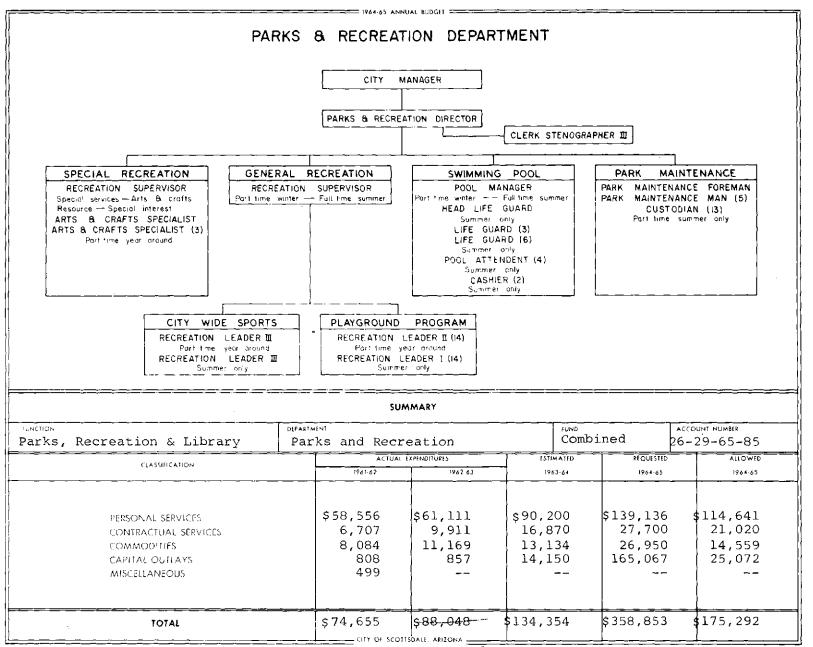

New York State and Louisiana State Certification American Library Association Arizona State Library Association The Scottsdale Community Library opened 1963-64 in a new and larger location at 133 East Main Street, adjacent to the Police and City Court Building. The new location enabled more borrowers to have easier access to a larger book stock. The total book stock as of June 30, 1964 was 26,995 volumes or a 31% increase over the 20,628 volumes available for circulation as of June 30, 1963. The number of active borrowers increased almost 30% during 1963-64 over the previous fiscal year.

The library's book stock will continue to expand during 1964-65 in order to offer higher levels of service in this field. The new fiscal year began with the addition of a children's librarian to assist and organize that important section of our library. It is expected that other increases in levels of service will take place in all other library functions during 1964-65.

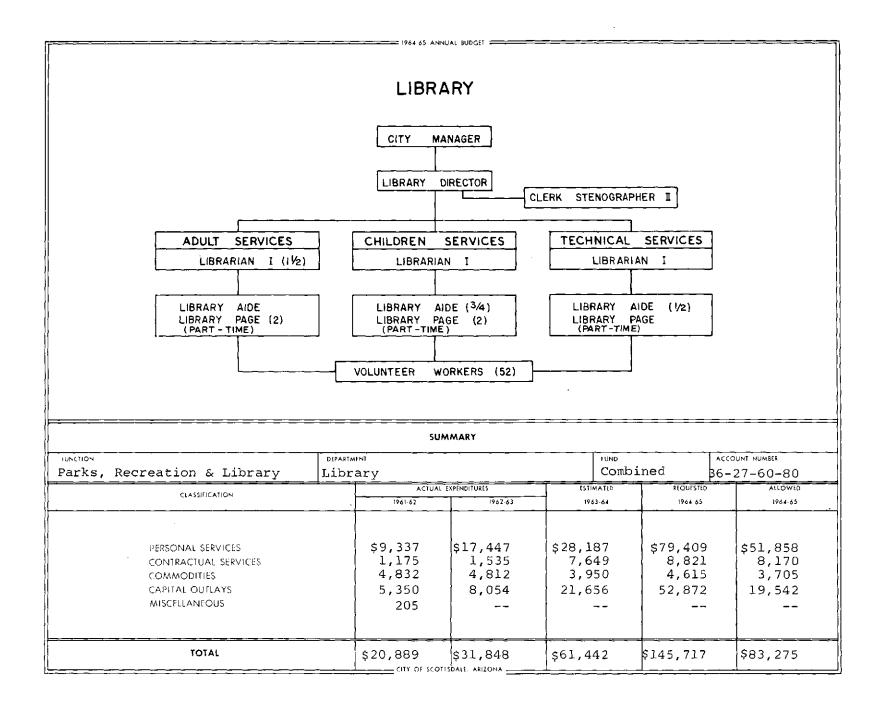

A RESOLUTION FINALLY DETERMINING AND ADOPTING ESTIMATES OF PROPOSED EXPENDITURES BY THE CITY OF SCOTTSDALE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 1964, AND ENDING JUNE 30, 1965, DECLARING THAT SUCH SHALL CONSTITUTE A BUDGET OF THE CITY OF SCOTTSDALE FOR SUCH FISCAL YEAR, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of the laws of the State of Arizona, the Charter and ordinances of the City of Scottsdale, the City Council is required to adopt a budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1964, and ending June 30, 1965, and

WHEREAS, the City Council has prepared and filed with the City Clerk its tentative budget, and

WHEREAS, due notice has been given by the City Clerk, as required by law, that said tentative budget is on file and open to inspection by anyone interested, and

WHEREAS, a hearing has been had on said tentative budget, as required by law,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SCOTTSDALE, as follows:

SECTION 1. That this Council has finally determined and adopted the attached estimates of proposed expenditures for the various purposes therein named and set forth for the conduct of the business of the city government of the City of Scottsdale for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1964, and ending June 30, 1965, and that the same shall constitute the official annual budget of the City for said fiscal year.

SECTION 2. Upon the recommendation by the City Manager and with the approval of the City Council, expenditures may be made from the appropriation for Contingencies. The transfer of any sums within any specific appropriation may be made only upon approval by the City Manager.

SECTION 3. Money from any fund may be used for any of these appropriations, except money specifically restricted by State law or City Ordinances and Resolutions.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SCOTTSDALE, MARICOPA COUNTY, ARIZONA, LEVYING UPON THE ASSESSED VALUATION OF THE PROPERTY WITHIN THE CITY OF SCOTTSDALE SUBJECT TO TAXATION A CERTAIN SUM UPON EACH ONE HUNDRED (\$100.00) DOLLARS OF VALUATION SUFFICIENT TO RAISE THE AMOUNT ESTIMATED TO BE REQUIRED IN THE ANNUAL BUDGET, LESS THE AMOUNT ESTIMATED TO BE RECEIVED FROM FINES, LICENSES AND OTHER SOURCES OF REVENUE; PROVIDING FUNDS FOR VARIOUS BOND REDEMPTIONS, FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING INTEREST UPON BONDED INDEBTEDNESS; PROVIDING A GENERAL FUND FOR GENERAL MUNICIPAL EXPENSES; AND THE PUBLIC WORKS RESERVE FUND, ALL FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING THE 30TH DAY OF JUNE, 1965 AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, by the provisions of the City Charter and the State law, the ordinance levying taxes for the fiscal year 1964-65 is required to be finally adopted seven (7) days after the adoption of the final budget and

WMEREAS, the County of Maricopa is now the assessing and collecting authority for the City of Scottsdale, the City Clerk is hereby directed to transmit a certified copy of this ordinance to the Assessor and the Board of Supervisors of Maricopa County, Arizona.

NOW, THEREFOR, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Scottsdale, as Follows:

SECTION 1. There is hereby levied on each One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars of the assessed value of all property, both real and personal, within the corporate limits of the City of Scottsdale, except such property as may be by law exempt from taxation, a tax rate sufficient to raise the amount of Three Hundred Seventy-Four Thousand, Four Hundred Twenty-One (\$374,421) Dollars for the purpose of providing a GENERAL MUNICIPAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSE FUND OF THE CITY OF SCOTTSDALE for the fiscal year ending on the 30th day of June, 1965, but not to exceed Fifty-One (\$.51) Cents per each One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars assessed valuation of all real and personal property in the City of Scottsdale subject to taxation.

Appendix B - (Page 2 - Cont'd.) City of Scottsdale, Arizona ORDINANCE NO. 205A

SECTION 2. In addition to the rates set in Section 1 hereof, there is hereby levied on each One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars of assessed value of all property, both real and personal within the corporate limits of the City of Scottsdale except such property as may be by law exempt from taxation, a tax rate sufficient to raise the sum of One Hundred Forty-Two Thousand, Eight Hundred Sixty-Eight (\$142,868) Dollars, but not more than the actual debt service due during the year for the purpose of providing an INTEREST AND REDEMPTION FUND ON OUTSTANDING BONDS OF THE CITY OF SCOTTSDALE for the fiscal year ending on June 30, 1965.

SECTION 3. In addition to the tax rates set in Sections 1 and 2 hereof, there is hereby levied upon each One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars of assessed value of all property, both real and personal, within the corporate limits of the City of Scottsdale, except such property as may be by law exempt from taxation, a tax rate which is to be determined by the difference between the total of the rates in Sections 1 and 2 hereof, and the amount of One Dollar and Seven Cents (\$1.07) per One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars but not to exceed Thirty-six (\$.36) Cents per each One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars of the assessed value of all real and personal property in the City of Scottsdale subject to taxation, such sum to be set aside and used for the Public Works Reserve Fund.

If, when the actual assessed valuation of the City of Scottsdale, is finally determined for the year by Maricopa County, or for any reason the amounts as set forth in Section 1, 2 and 3 are found to be in excess of those permitted by law, such excesses are to be considered as though levied by this section for the Public Works Reserve Fund.

SECTION 4. If, for any reason, the rate of One Dollar and Seven Cents (\$1.07) per One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars assessed valuation will not raise the taxes required in Sections 1, 2 and 3, then reductions shall be made in the following order to the extent necessary so that the total tax rate shall be One Dollar and Seven Cents (\$1.07) per One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars assessed valuation; first, the amount levied by Section 3, and second, the amount levied by Section 1.

ORDINANCE NO. 205A

SECTION 5. No failure by the County officials of Maricopa County, Arizona, to properly return the delinquent list and no irregularity in the assessment or omission in the same, or irregularity of any kind in any proceedings shall invalidate such proceedings or invalidate any title conveyed by any tax deed; nor shall any failure or neglect of any officer or officers to perform any of the duties assigned to him or to them on the day within the time specified work an invalidation of any proceedings or of any such deed or sale or affect the validity of the assessment and levy of taxes or of the judgment of sale by which the collection of the same may be enforced or in any manner affect the lien of the City upon such property for the delinquent taxes unpaid thereon, and no overcharge as to part of the taxes or of costs shall invalidate any proceedings for the collection of taxes or the foreclosure; and all acts of officers de facto shall be valid as if performed by officers de jure

SECTION 6. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 7. WHEREAS, the immediate operation of the provisions of this ordinance is necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an EMERGENCY is hereby declared to exist, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Council, approval by the Mayor and publication and posting as required by law, and is hereby exempted from the referendum clause of the City Charter.

PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Scottsdale this 18th day of June, 1964.
