

Olympian to Special Olympics coach: A volunteer's journey



If volunteering is a testament to the timeless truth that it “takes a village to raise a child,” a perfect case in point is Scottsdale Police Department employee Alex Sachs.

Last December, the police aide volunteered to coach the Scottsdale Bobcat's first-ever soccer team and brought the group to victory, securing a

gold medal in their debut at the Arizona Special Olympics Tournament in Chandler.

It didn't hurt that Sachs is also a former Olympian, who spent years as a professional women's soccer player and Brazilian Soccer Hall of Fame inductee. However, Sachs says the key to the team's success is embracing inclusivity and recognizing individual potential.

Most of the team had never played soccer before joining the Bobcats, some had never even kicked a ball, but what the group lacked in experience, they made up for with enthusiasm and determination.

“I had to start from scratch and break the game down, just like I would to any beginner,” Sachs said. “Everyone put in the work and the practice, but we also just had fun.”

And the practice it turned out, made perfect.

“It was a great experience to work with these kids each practice and see their excitement – and confidence – grow,” she added.

Next season, Sachs aims to expand the program's impact by fielding two teams.

Off the field, Sachs is no stranger to community service. She leads a senior walking club at the Via Linda Senior Center and organizes teambuilding events with elementary school students as part of the PAL (Police Activities League) Program.

April is National Volunteer Month, and Sachs's story is just one among Scottsdale's nearly 4,000 volunteers. From feeding seniors to shelving library books, volunteers provided almost 200,000 hours of service to the city in fiscal year 2022/23.

“Everyone has a story; everyone has potential,” she said. “And that's what motivates me to help others and make our community better – it's a great feeling.”

Investing in Our Scottsdale: Police Fire Training Facility



First responders in Scottsdale will soon enjoy an improved training environment thanks to a project that will modernize and expand the infrastructure at the city's Tom Hontz Police and Fire Training Facility. Improvements include a 4-5 story burn tower, a vehicle training track, indoor shooting range, and areas for training technical and aircraft rescue crews. Three separate bond projects approved by voters in 2019 fund the project. The facility is located just south of the Scottsdale border in Tempe near Miller and Curry roads. Construction is expected to be complete early in 2025.

Take a hike ... but know the dangers. Don't let the relatively mild temperatures and beauty of the Sonoran Desert fool you. Hiking can be risky business. Following simple, common-sense tips like making a hiking plan, having the essentials, staying on the trail and being mindful of trail etiquette. ScottsdaleAZ.gov, search "hiking safety"

Help prevent wildfires. Be on the lookout for Globe Chamomile, a fast-moving invasive plant in Arizona. Explore your property and be diligent about pulling it now before yellow ball flowers develop mature seeds and dry out in our summer heat. Plants resemble a carrot plant with dark green leaves and a strong odor. Just one pull will prevent the spread of thousands of seeds. Invasive plants upset the sensitive and natural ecological balance of the surrounding area and can also disrupt the habitat for desert wildlife. In addition, it could become a major fire fuel source during the hot weather when these weeds dry out. Visit ScottsdaleAZ.gov, search "invasive plants" to learn more.
