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According to the Arizona Affiliate of the Partnership for a Drug-Free America, kids are more likely to experiment with drugs due to boredom, spending time with friends who use drugs or too much unsupervised time throughout the summer months. In June and July alone, there was a startling 40 percent increase nationally in the number of youth who tried marijuana for the first time compared to the rest of the year. Even though we are through the summer months, we still need to be diligent about the dangers affecting our kids.

Even more startling is the newest trend – intentional misuse of prescription medications, which is the largest teen substance abuse challenge we face today. According to the National Institute of Drug Abuse (NIDA) abusing prescription and over-the-counter drugs can be just as dangerous, addictive and even deadlier as using "street" drugs. The National Survey on Drug Use and Health (HSDUH) states, "every day 2,500 teens abuse a prescription drug for the first time." The trend is alarming:

- The number of new abusers of Rx drugs is now greater than new users of marijuana (NSDUH SAMSHA)
- Rx drugs are now the most commonly abused drugs among 12-13 year olds (NSDUH)
- Rx/OTC medications account for 7 of the 11 most frequently abused drugs (NIDA)

Aggravating the issue are weak perceptions of risk among both teens and their parents – both believe abusing medicine is NOT as dangerous as using "street" drugs. Consider the ease of access to teens – medicines are readily

Please, always drive *with* caution and *without* distractions when driving around our neighborhoods. This is especially important on Halloween when pedestrian traffic is increased.

The following are a few Halloween safety tips for your family and friends: Keep costumes short to prevent trips, encourage children to wear comfortable shoes, try makeup instead of masks, make sure children wear reflective tape on their costumes, younger children should be accompanied by an adult, set a time limit for children to trick-or-treat, map out a safe route and avoid "short cuts," remind children not to enter houses, try to trick-or-treat while it is still light out, carry a flashlight, cell phone and report any suspicious activity to the police.

available in their own or a friends medicine cabinet. Teens abuse their own prescriptions, a family members or a friend's prescription. Medicine abuse has become "normalized" in teen culture. In Arizona twelfth grade students abuse prescription medications at twice the national rate. The effects of prescription and over the counter drug use are not to be taken lightly:

- Seizures, Heart Attack, Stroke
- Permanent Brain Damage and Liver Damage
- Slow Breathing
- Small Pinpoint Pupils
- Dizziness
- Weakness
- Nausea, Vomiting, Seizures
- Death

The Arizona Affiliate of The Partnership for a Drug-Free America encourages parents and community members to take action by following these 3 steps:

- *Educate* themselves on the medications kids are abusing
- *Communicate* the risks of abusing medicine with their children
- *Safeguard* their medicine cabinets and ask family and friends to do the same

The Scottsdale Police Department and the Arizona Affiliate of the Partnership for a Drug-Free America are pleased to offer you the Rx360 program. Rx360 is a research-based community education program developed by the Partnership for a Drug-Free America to raise awareness of the problem of prescription drug abuse by middle and high school-age children.

"We are pleased to be partnering with the Arizona Affiliate for this important program," said Commander Bill Wilton. "Teens take their lives into their own hands when they intentionally abuse prescription medications. Whether it's to get high or deal with stress, or if they mistakenly believe it will help them perform better in school or sports. Teens do not realize that when they abuse medication or use without a prescription, these medicines can be every bit as harmful as illegal street drugs. We have to educate our community on this issue."

A recent article from Join Together on September 8th, 2009 stated, "23 percent of teens say they can get marijuana within an hour and that prescription drugs

are easier to obtain than beer – findings echoed in stories from young drug users themselves." Each child faces pressure and how we work with them on handling that pressure is extremely important. If we as parents allow ourselves to become complacent or self-absorbed, we may miss the signs telling us that something is wrong. As adults, we may have the pressures of a divorce, a death in the family, work obligations or even a marriage. Let's ask ourselves, how is it affecting our children. Take the time to ask them about their day. If you notice any changes in mood, attitude, grades or feelings ask them about it. Those minutes may be the most important of your life and theirs!
