CALL TO ORDER

Chair lacovo called the regular meeting of the Scottsdale Transportation Commission to order at 5:15 p.m.

Chair welcomed new Commissioner, Emmie Cardella, who was present as an observer and will attend her first meeting in her official capacity in November.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There were no public comments.

1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

VICE CHAIR ANDERSON MOVED TO APPROVE THE REGULAR MEETING MINUTES OF THE TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION ON SEPTEMBER 15, 2022 AS PRESENTED. COMMISSIONER KOWAL SECONDED THE MOTION, WHICH CARRIED 5-0 WITH CHAIR IACOVO, VICE CHAIR ANDERSON COMMISSIONERS KOWAL, LALL AND WILCOXON VOTING IN THE AFFIRMATIVE WITH NO DISSENTING VOTES.

2. **SUSTAINABILITY PLAN**

Lisa McNeilly, Sustainability Director, provided a brief history of sustainability in Scottsdale. The Sustainability Plan was identified in the General Plan for action and was included in last year's and this year's Strategic Plan. A contract was begun with ASU in August to help craft the Plan. The community engagement process was discussed and the City agencies involved were outlined. Five pathways were identified: Low emissions and climate action; nature-based; equitable community; resiliency; circular systems. Fifteen topics were included in the sustainability plan and related plans were identified.

Commissioner inquired about discussions regarding partnering with power companies for grid resilience and renewable energy. Ms. McNeilly confirmed that discussions have occurred, with one company having made a commitment to be present at the community meeting. More of this type of approach will be addressed in conjunction with the Net Zero Strategic Energy Plan called for by City Council. Partnering with utility companies in development of the Plan is a vital component.

Ms. McNeilly discussed the strategies of the mobility component and their accompanying actions. Many of the strategies and actions were derived from input from Transportation staff and others from community workshops. The Plan timeline was reviewed.

Chair noted that Commissioners have read the plan and will forward individual comments via email to Mark Melnychenko, Transportation & Streets Director with a cc to Kyle Lofgren.

Commissioner inquired as to whether individuals who reside outside the City may attend upcoming workshops. Ms. McNeilly stated that no limitations on attendance have been made.

Chair noted that the General Plan and the Transportation Action Plan (TAP) each have emphasis on the Sustainability Plan and she commended staff for tackling this important issue.

3. PUBLIC INFORMATION AND COMMUNITY OUTREACH PLAN

Cristina Lenko, Public Information Officer, provided an update on the growing list of community partners. One of the efforts to promote the TAP is via transportation fun facts posted on social media. Over the past few months, staff has worked on several traffic improvements, including installing a speed feedback sign on Bell Road east of Thompson Peak Parkway. Notification for sidewalk paving on the north side of Camelback Road between 75th Street and Miller was completed as well as construction of a dedicated U-turn lane on Shea Boulevard at Pima Crossing. Each project included implementation of communications plans, including community

notification, flyers and postcards, individual outreach to HOAs and commercial businesses and social media posts.

An overview of the Old Town ADA ramp improvement project was provided. The project began in July and is scheduled for completion next week. Community outreach activities were discussed. The project area map was reviewed. The City continues to look for opportunities to sponsor and promote special events throughout Scottsdale. Some events include: National Walk, Bike and Roll to School Day; Bell94 Sports Complex dedication event; Bike Month/Call to Artists; Ride to Read; Trolley promotion/Scottsdale Library; Weather Response Team/Street Operations.

Ms. Lenko provided an update on the ADOT Loop 101 widening project. A public meeting will be held on November 2, 2022. Information on the meeting has been provided via postcards, Scottsdale Update, Economic Development e-newsletter, Chamber of Commerce e-newsletter and will be posted on Chamber and Economic Development social media platforms.

An overview was provided on the Transportation Department website, which includes 13 individual web pages. This year there have over 63,000 web views with 40 percent of visitors utilizing the transit and paths and trails web pages. Since the Transportation Commission's May meeting, there have been several updates to a number of web pages, with a focus on the Trolley system and Valley Metro website. The City is no longer printing brochures and aims to have public information provided via the website. Public notifications and QR code technology have been implemented.

In response to a question from Chair regarding public participation in meetings, Ms. Lenko stated that much of the community outreach has been via postcard notification, email notification and door to door canvassing. A public meeting has been scheduled for December regarding traffic calming at Jackrabbit Curve. Approximately 500 to 600 individuals have been invited to attend and this will be a good gauge of the public's interest in attending in-person meetings post pandemic.

Chair stressed the need for effective communication with the aging population regarding transportation resources and opportunities in Scottsdale. Ms. Lenko concurred that transit training is an important component with the overall plan. In addition, the City will be partnering with schools to educate students regarding trolley routes.

4. MARICOPA ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENTS (MAG) DESIGN ASSISTANCE APPLICATIONS AND OTHER GRANT SUBMITTALS

Susan Conklu, Senior Transportation Planner, provided a brief overview of MAG's Design Assistance Program. The City has recently prepared several recent and/or pending funding grants, including:

- Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE)
- MAG Design Assistance
- MAG Road Safety Program (RSP)
- Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP)
- Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A)

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An overview of the individual grant program applications, criteria and award status updates was provided.

Commissioner cited the 20 percent cash requirement for resubmittals and inquired as to the typical source of funding. Ms. Conklu stated that it is usually derived from the two-tenths percent transportation local tax. Dave Meinhart, Transportation Planning Manager, added that there is also funding in the transportation operating budget for studies. Another source is the bikeways-wide capital project.

In response to a Commissioner question, Ms. Conklu stated that there was approval for 100 percent funding of the MAG Design Assistance Grant in the amount of \$75,000.

Commissioner referred to the MAG Design Assistance Grant and asked whether there are requirements to further the project once the design is completed. Ms. Conklu said there is no such requirement. Sometimes, the feasibility reflects too high a cost to move forward with the project at the given time. The program restricts design levels to 15 percent.

Purpose:

Provide information and a staff recommendation for the Thunderbird Trail between 76th Street and 83rd Street

Background:

Scottsdale has been preparing plans and building public trails for the last five decades. In 2004, after an extensive public involvement process, the *Scottsdale Trails Master Plan: On the Right Trail* was adopted by City Council. In 2007, the Transportation Department assumed responsibility for public trails outside Scottsdale's McDowell Sonoran Preserve and kept the commitment to include trails within an element of the first Transportation Master Plan update which occurred in 2016. In 2009 the Ad Hoc Citizens Trails Task Force Final Report recommended the city prioritize Neighborhood-Local Trails to provide access in and around neighborhood areas and provide connections to Primary and Secondary Trails. The *2022 Transportation Action Plan* (TAP) Trail Element fine-tuned past planning efforts and aligns with previous policies, network alignments and design standards. The TAP also prioritizes the completion of neighborhood trails, especially in areas where sidewalks are not installed.

Scottsdale currently has 153 miles of unpaved trails outside the McDowell Sonoran Preserve that are woven throughout neighborhoods within the city. The 2022 Transportation Action Plan documents 140 miles of planned trails that will complete the buildout of the network over future years. This citywide trail network provides interconnected recreational and transportation opportunities for residents and visitors. Trails function as transportation links between schools, residential areas, parks, places of employment, shopping areas and other areas of interest such as trailheads within the Preserve. Trails are utilized by walkers, equestrians, hikers, runners, cyclists, and people with disabilities. Many neighborhoods in the city, including this portion of the Thunderbird corridor, do not have sidewalks, and a trail serves as the off-street facility for these users.

The Thunderbird Trail is included in the 2022 Transportation Action Plan Trail Element:

- Scottsdale Planned Trail Network Map
- Goal TR-1 Develop an effective and connected multi-modal transportation system with the integration of trails.
- Goal TR-3 Provide improved trail connectivity within neighborhoods and access to schools and parks.

The Thunderbird Trail was also included in previous trail master plans mentioned above.

In fall 2021, the city began design of a 6-foot-wide unpaved trail on the north side of Thunderbird Road between 76th and 83rd Streets within city right-of-way, with the segment from 76th Street to Hayden Road now in place. This trail will improve neighborhood non-motorized access to Northsight Park and the Loop 101 freeway corridor trails, by connecting to the existing trail on the north side of Thunderbird Road from 83rd Street to the west side of the Loop 101. The existing trail connects to the non-motorized bridge over the Loop 101 at Sweetwater Avenue via existing trails on both sides of the Loop 101. The existing trail on Thunderbird Road also connects to the loop trail around Northsight Park at 84th Street. There are no sidewalks along Thunderbird Road from 76th Street to 84th Street. There are existing bike lanes and bike routes on Thunderbird Road from Hayden Road to 84th Street, with plans for future buffered bike lanes. Bike lanes are also in place on Hayden Road and 84th Street south of Thunderbird Road.

A key point to consider is the property on the northwest corner of Thunderbird Road and 83rd Street has driveway access to its garage from 83rd Street and an additional circular driveway with access

from Thunderbird Road. The Thunderbird Road access drive links to the front of the home There are no other properties with driveway access along the north side of Thunderbird between 76th Street and 83rd Street that the trail will cross.

Update:

In March 2022 the first phase of the planned trail was constructed between 76th Street and Hayden Road. This included an intermittent single rail pipe fence along both sides of the trail from Hayden Road west to 76th Street to delineate the trail and help prevent vehicle turn-arounds on the vacant right-of-way.

The second phase of the trail is being constructed between Hayden Road and 83rd Street. The segment will include Americans with Disabilities (ADA) curb ramps at Hayden Road, 81st Street and 83rd Street. Construction is planned for winter 2023. This will complete the final gap in the trail along Thunderbird Road from 76th Street to the Loop 101 freeway corridor.

Public notification letters were sent to neighbors in March and September 2022. Feedback was received from a few residents in spring 2022. This included questions about the intermittent pipe fence along the trail west of Hayden Road, as well as questions from the property owner on the northwest corner of Thunderbird Road and 83rd Street. The property owner has contacted staff on several occasions and has repeated a request that there be no trail construction north of the Thunderbird Road curb line. The current design minimizes impacts along the property frontage in this location by placing a 4-6-foot-wide trail attached to the curb in the city's road right-of-way adjacent to this property. The road right-of-way extends approximately 15 feet north of the existing curb. The trail construction will not disturb the turf area on the property or utilize the trail easement north of the road right-of-way, which was dedicated in December 2008 by a prior owner when the homesite was approved for reconstruction. The trail will be 6-feet wide for the remainder of the segment from Hayden Road to 83rd Street, which is consistent with Neighborhood Trail guidelines and ties into the existing trail section east of 83rd Street.

Path & Trails Subcommittee Recommendation:

Transportation staff presented the Thunderbird Trail project to the Paths & Trails Subcommittee at the October 4, 2022 meeting. Discussion included the recently constructed trail and adjacent commercial properties west of Hayden Road, equestrian properties and use in the neighborhood, constraints on the south side of Thunderbird, the adjacent property and owner feedback on the northwest corner of Hayden and 83rd Street, and the possibility of an improved crossing at Hayden Road and Thunderbird. The subcommittee approved (4-0) a motion to move forward with the current trail design as is and bring the recommendation forward to the Transportation Commission.

Staff Recommendation:

Move forward with construction of the current trail design presented by staff when the city's on-call contractor has availability.

Next Steps:

Staff will move forward with construction of the concrete curb ramps and the trail when the city's oncall contractors have availability.

Dear City of Scottsdale Transportation Commission,

I am the homeowner at 13804 N. 83rd Street and am in receipt of the City of Scottsdale's September 12, 2022 letter from Susan Conklu. The letter says, "Scottsdale is planning to construct a new section of unpaved trail and Americans with Disabilities curb ramps on the north side of Thunderbird Road between 76th and 83rd Streets." It continues: "City staff will present an overview of the project at the following meetings." One of these meetings is the upcoming November 17, 2022 Transportation Commission meeting. According to the letter: "The project's goal is to improve neighborhood connectivity to Northsight Park and the city's overall transportation system. The planned improvements are located within the city's right-of-way. Construction is currently scheduled to begin in winter of 2023. A map of the trail area, and project-related FAQ's are included in this mailing."

My home front faces Thunderbird Road. The home is completely finished runs all the way to the edge of the street, including two driveways. It is shown here:




My concern is that the current plans appear to contemplate an extension of the trail from 83rd Street, including a ramp, that would directly impact my property, including encroaching upon it, as shown here:



On May 3, 2022, I met with Greg Davies and recorded portions of this conversation. Mr. Davies assured me that the City of Scottsdale would not pursue any alterations to areas along Thunderbird Rd in front of my house. He admitted, the City of Scottsdale "dropped the damn ball" with respect to this trail. He also indicated that a ramp may be placed West of my property for a portion of the trail, and a bike lane and walking path would be shared similar to many areas close by. He said there was "nothing wrong with that" and "let's just call it a day." After that conversation, I thought the matter was resolved. However, now it appears Mr. Davies' assurances may not honored.

The city can save a considerable amount of money by just using the existing East Gray Road Street, that curves from 81st Street and Thunderbird to 83rd Street and Thunderbird, as an easy existing street link as shown here:



This option maintains the status quo and poses no additional significant costs to Scottsdale taxpayers. To be clear, if my property rights are impacted by the city's plans, I intend to pursue all legal remedies, including requesting and injunction and seeking damages.

Please place this letter in the record, so that there is an accurate account of the history of this matter.

Meeting Date: November 17, 2022

Action: Review staff recommendations for Capital Improvement Plan project priorities.

Purpose:

Present proposed Transportation and Streets Department priorities for capital projects in fiscal years 2023-2024 through 2027-2028 (FY 24-28).

Information:

Each year the City Council adopts a five-year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) as part of the annual budget adoption process. Only the first year of the CIP is funded, with the following four years serving as a forecast of future capital project budget needs. In addition, the Transportation and Streets CIP is adjusted to match the funding levels programmed by the Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG) in their annual update of the Arterial Life Cycle Program (ALCP).

The primary sources of funding for transportation capital projects are the City's 0.2% Transportation Privilege Tax, the Regional 0.5% Transportation Sales Tax (Proposition 400), and Federal grants. Scottsdale voters passed Question 1 in November 2018, which authorized the City to collect an additional 0.1% Transportation Privilege Tax for a period of 10 years. The priority use of this temporary funding source is to ensure the availability of the 30% local match required for ALCP roadway corridor improvements.

The first step in the annual CIP process, per State law, is the re-budgeting of projects not completed during the current fiscal year, unless they have been terminated or deferred by the City Council. The second step is determining whether existing projects have appropriate budgets and whether new sources of funding (grants, developer contributions, etc.) have become available to reduce the use of City funds. After these steps have been taken, a combination of projects that have been previously reviewed, but not funded in the current fiscal year, and new projects are identified for consideration and prioritization.

The FY 24 CIP development cycle is currently at the departmental prioritization stage. The Transportation and Streets Department's priorities will then go through a citywide review process that results in a recommendation to the City Manager. The City Manager's recommendation is then presented to the City Council, which considers the input of the department and the Transportation Commission.

The Transportation and Street Department's CIP recommendations are provided below through a series of tables.

Staff Recommendations:

Table 1 includes standalone, non-ALCP transportation projects recommended for re-budgeting to allow for their completion. These projects are not requesting funding changes in FY 24-28.



We have lived in the area since 2010 and have many personal examples of how dangerous 68th Street from Camelback to Indian School is to pedestrians. Through the grace of God there haven't been fatalities or serious injuries (it is just a matter of when and not if however).. We have encountered hostile drivers, individuals who seek pleasure by intimidating those walking or on bikes, and many close calls due to the lack of a safe means to walk. We are active daily "walkers" and for the most part find ourselves modifying our route to the canal for exercise or a routine visit to the many merchants in the Old Town area. We have had items thrown at us from passing cars; drivers deliberately moving the car closer to us as we are walking along the street for amusement in watching us having to jump into residence landscaping to avoid their vehicles; the very common car horn honking as they pass by to frighten us, and, finally, the "close" right or left turns onto the E/W streets causing us to jump back or into the bushes etc. We have watched bicyclists being harassed and a few fall over after being forced to take evasive action from the aggressive drivers on 68th street. Memo to the City of Scottsdale Transportation Commissioners, This commission will review the Proposed Capital Improvement Projects during the upcoming November 17, 2022 meeting, agenda item #5. You will be asked to consider, amongst other matters, the completion of the sidewalk along 68th Street between Camelback Road and the AZ Canal. In of itself, this may not seem like a momentous event and yet it is. Building the sidewalk closes a long existing gap in development that joins Old Town, the Fashion Square Mall, the AZ Canal Trail and residential neighborhoods, creating a safe walkable corridor that integrates this community. In addition, citizens will be able to effectively and safely connect to the public transportation available along Indian School and Camelback Roads. By supporting the 68th Street Sidewalk the commission will begin a process to complete a project of significant urgency to all the residents of the surrounding area. Building the sidewalk will ensure safe passage for pedestrians and people with disabilities for whom the luxury of a safe walking corridor is denied. Dear Transportation Commissioners, The City's goals laid out by the Council and this Commission, emphasize a strategic outcome for central Scottsdale and Old Town for pedestrian accommodation and to create a "walkable" environment. Dear Transportation Commission Members, My name is Joanna, I am a Scottsdale resident. I am also an instructor at Saavi Services for the Blind, I would like to express my support for the construction of a pedestrian sidewalk on North 68th Street. A sidewalk on 68th Street, north of Indian School Road, will be beneficial to all local residents and visitors. Parents and caregivers will be able to safely walk with strollers, bike riders will not have to share their lane with pedestrians or joggers, cars will have their space better defined. All will benefit. A specific group whose life will definitely be made easier with the construction of this sidewalk is the blind and low-vision community. The benefit is the safety that a sidewalk provides for a blind pedestrian. A sidewalk for a blind individual walking with a cane defines the space of travel: it is usually the space between the curb on the street side and a lawn or gravel or any other material on the residential or commercial side of the sidewalk. This defined space ensures a higher degree of safety and prevents the person from veering into the traffic. A white cane user is able to determine the direction of his or her travel, the width of the sidewalk, or the upcoming corner when walking on a sidewalk. They are also able to tell if they are crossing a residential or commercial driveway or a street. The specific markers that allow such identification are present when there is a sidewalk. The gutter line, the seam between the street pavement and the gutter, the truncated domes

that indicate to a visually impaired pedestrian when they are about to leave the sidewalk and enter the street, are there if there is a sidewalk. A side of a street without a sidewalk does not provide such indicators. The cane cannot detect the bicycle lane. often utilized by the pedestrians when there is no sidewalk, because the lane is a visual not tactile indicator. Therefore, the blind pedestrian is more likely to walk into the traffic or actually abandon foot travel altogether and just stay home. Scottsdale, due to its nice winter climate, attracts older visitors. Retirees move in from other states. In fact, as none of us can escape aging, you or I may be the person whose vision is decreasing and who will benefit from the safety of strolling on a sidewalk. New housing structures, such as the Optima Sonoran Village, increase foot traffic. We all enjoy a nice walk to Scottsdale downtown or on the canal. A sidewalk on 68th Street, connecting Camelback Road and Indian School Road would make it much safer and more pleasant for all.
