SCOTTSDALE CELEBRATES 60 YEARS OF SPRING TRAINING

Scottsdale spring training turns 60 this March, a magical journey filled with legends, tall-tales and sun-splashed memories.

Ty Cobb, Ted Williams and Carl Yastrzemski once spent a spring here refining the art of hitting. Ernie Banks charmed fans with his trademark request to “Let’s play two.”

Buster Posey, “Mad Bum” and The Panda helped bring three championships to the Giants in five years. This was their launching pad.

“Scottsdale Stadium just feels like home,” once wrote Gwen Knapp, a sports columnist who considers it one of the most iconic sports venues in the nation.

When the original Scottsdale Stadium opened in 1955 it could comfortably seat the town’s population of 3,500. The Baltimore Orioles were the stadium’s first spring training tenant. The Red Sox, the Cubs, the Athletics and Giants would follow.

SCOTTSDALE'S MUSEUM OF THE WEST IS NOW A SMITHSONIAN AFFILIATE

Iconic artifacts and cultural treasures from the Smithsonian collection will be coming to Western Spirit: Scottsdale's Museum of the West, thanks to a recent affiliate agreement.

The formal relationship means that in the future, visitors to the Downtown Scottsdale museum will see items from the Smithsonian collection along with educational programming and expert speakers on a variety of topics related to the American West.


The museum, which opened in January 2015, features rotating exhibitions of hundreds of Western artworks and historic artifacts.

Current exhibitions include a salute to Cowboy Artists of America and reflections on the journey of Lewis and Clark, featuring the artwork of Charles Fritz.

Other exhibits include authentic Old West spurs, badges, cowboy gear and saddles; rare Navajo blankets; and paintings by a number of influential Western artists.

The city built and owns the facility, which is operated by the Scottsdale Museum of the West, a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization.

The fun begins at high noon Jan. 29 when more than two dozen riders with the Hashknife Pony Express gallop into town.

They'll end a 200-mile horseback trek at the Legacy Sculpture on Marshall Way at the Waterfront. After a brief ceremony, the public is invited to meet with both riders and horses at Scottsdale's Museum of the West, 3830 N. Marshall Way.
