CHAIR SHEARER, VICE-CHAIR SERLIN, COMMISSIONERS DODDS, JUNG, JAMESON, LURIE, AND TURGEL VOTED IN THE AFFIRMATIVE. THERE WERE NO DISSENTING VOTES.

Ms. Witkofski noted that the funds have already been allocated to the Emergency Repair Programs. The City is contracting with Habitat for Humanity, which will be paid for each job this agency completes for Scottsdale's Housing Programs, freeing up City staff time.

## 8. <u>FY 2023/2024 HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME) Applications Funding</u>

Discussion ensued and the Commission made formal allocation recommendations for HOME Funding Applications as follows:

COMMISSIONER JAMESON MOVED TO APPROVE THE HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM (HOME) APPLICATIONS FORMAL FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS.

COMMISSIONER JUNG SECONDED THE MOTION, WHICH CARRIED SEVEN (7) TO ZERO (0) BY ROLL CALL VOTE. CHAIR SHEARER, VICE-CHAIR SERLIN, COMMISSIONERS DODDS, JUNG, JAMESON, LURIE, AND TURGEL VOTED IN THE AFFIRMATIVE. THERE WERE NO DISSENTING VOTES.

Commissioners asked clarifying questions. Ms. Witkofski explained that the City is a member of the Maricopa County Home Consortium and a sub-recipient of Maricopa County's HOME funds. Historically, per the five-year consolidated annual action plan approved by City Council the funds are used for the purchase and rehabilitation of property to increase the City's affordable housing stock. ARM of Save the Family has been the agency involved for over a decade. This home purchase will be number 20 in the City's housing stock of affordable units. HOME requires that there be a 15 to 20-year affordability period, which involves the City placing a lien on the property through a land-use restrictive agreement and the property must be rented under HUD guideline standards. Ms. Witkofski noted that for program FY 2023/24, the annual action plan with Maricopa County has been amended so that those funds can be used to help Scottsdale's senior population, which have been being displaced at an alarming rate. The \$269,000 being allocated to ARM of Save the Family is being funded with leftover HOME funds.

### 9. Identification of Future Agenda Items

Possible future agenda items include:

- Work study session to provide feedback on the funding process
- Consideration of conducting a homeless count separate from the national Point-in-Time count

The next meeting is scheduled for April 13, 2023.
