- Include links in the Sustainability Plan to other city documents and resources, including building codes, water, and transportation plans.
- Ensure final reports for both plans are easily understandable.
- Make sure there are target goals included in the Sustainability and Heat Mitigation Plans.
- Include an educational section in the Heat Mitigation Plan as to what causes increased temperatures and processes that can be used to mitigate heat island issues.
- Implement the recommendations discussed in the existing plans and be forward thinking to include future generations.
- Schedule a future discussion related to potential creation of funds for new affordable housing.
- Ensure the importance of community green spaces, such as public parks and our downtown civic space, are considered in the Heat Mitigation Plan.
- Create a thermal map of the McDowell Sonoran Preserve and other open spaces.

## **Cooler Scottsdale Study: Key Findings**

- Three growth areas Airpark, Old Town, and South Scottsdale had much higher land cover fractions for asphalt and buildings than the surrounding areas, and lower land cover fractions for trees and shrubs.
- On average, Scottsdale's growth areas have land surface temperatures that are 6-7°F higher than the rest of the City.

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## **Cooler Scottsdale Study: Key Findings**

- Of the 20 hottest census block groups in metropolitan Scottsdale, 19 were located in southern Scottsdale.
- Census block groups with higher average incomes had lower land surface temperatures. Land surface temperature decreased by more than 1°F for each \$10,000 increase in mean per capita income.

## **Cooler Scottsdale Study: Key Findings**

- Reductions in mean radiant temperature compared to fully exposed areas:
  - Approximately 55°F under mature, fully-leafed trees in Old Town and on Waterfront
  - Approximately 30°F under mature, desert-adapted trees
  - Up to 50°F under bus stops with full, wide shade structures

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


