#### Research Overview



- EMC Research worked with City of Scottsdale staff and the Protect and Preserve Scottsdale Task Force on a research effort designed to understand community priorities related to the Preserve, as well as the current opinions of Scottsdale residents around the City's fiscal environment
- This research involved two phases:
  - A statistically valid survey, open only to invited Scottsdale voters using random sample methodology
  - A public, open participation feedback tool that any interested Scottsdale resident could participate in
- In total, 1,733 Scottsdale voters and residents participated in this research effort across the two phases

This report focuses on voter survey findings and highlights some comparisons between the two research populations. Additional open participation feedback results can be found in the appendix.

#### Methodology: Voter Survey



- Part I of a two-phase research project
- Live telephone and online survey of registered voters in the City of Scottsdale
  - Phone interviews were conducted in English by trained, professional interviewers; landlines and mobile phones included (160n)
  - Email and text invitations were sent with link to web survey (240n)
- Survey conducted October 19-25, 2023
- 400 interviews; overall margin of error ±4.90 percentage points
- All slides referring to voter survey results are indicated in green

#### **Key Findings: Public Open Participation Feedback**



- Part II of a two-phase research project
- Opt-in online questionnaire open to Scottsdale residents
  - Distributed by the City and administered through the Polco platform, which the City uses to gain feedback and insights from city residents about issues that affect them
- Conducted October 27 November 19, 2023
- Available in English and Spanish
- 1,333 interviews
- All slides referring to open participation results are indicated in purple

# **Key Findings: Voter Survey**



- Voters are optimistic about Scottsdale's direction and the overall quality of life in the city.
- They see City parks and the McDowell Sonoran Preserve as a contributor to Scottsdale's high quality of life, and most voters are willing to invest tax dollars to maintain them.
- That said, there is some tax sensitivity, with around four-in-ten voters expressing hesitancy around the City's use of tax dollars.
- A majority of voters believe the City needs additional funding to maintain, improve, and operate parks and recreational sites and facilities, and rate many aspects as high priorities for funding.
- Voters respond positively to the overall idea of funding the Preserve and other Scottsdale parks and recreation facilities without increasing the tax rate. Most voters also see the more specific mechanisms of replacing an expiring tax and expanding the allowable uses of another tax as good ideas, but enthusiasm declines after they learn more about the specifics.

#### **Key Findings: Public Open Participation Feedback**



- Overall, the open participation respondents hold similar sentiments to voters and are positive about the quality of life in Scottsdale. Similarly, this group sees the value in parks and facilities and believes they should be supported by taxes.
- Respondents to the open participation research were more likely to express uncertainty when rating the conditions of the Preserve and City parks.
- Priorities for open participation respondents were largely similar to voters' opinions.
- Like voters, those who participated in the open participation research are in favor of maintaining parks and facilities and believe funding them through replacing and expanding the existing taxes is a good idea. However, when exposed to more information about mechanisms, support softens.





Do you feel that things in the City of Scottsdale are generally going in the right direction or do you feel things have gotten pretty seriously off on the wrong track?




# Right Direction/Wrong Track

Do you feel that things in the City of Scottsdale are generally going in the right direction or do you feel things have gotten pretty seriously off on the wrong track?




# **Quality of Life Rating**



Almost nine-in-ten Scottsdale voters rate the city's quality of life positively, with three-in-ten rating it excellent.


#### How would you rate the overall quality of life in Scottsdale?



## **Scottsdale Job Ratings**



Scottsdale voters rate city government and the financial health of the city positively, yet intensity is low. While a majority rate "the job the City does using tax dollars responsibly" favorably, positive intensity is the lowest, and it has the most negativity.








#### Scottsdale Parks Attitudes



Voters overwhelmingly agree that Scottsdale's parks and the Preserve improve quality of life and the local economy.




Scottsdale's parks and the Preserve help make Scottsdale a great place to visit, which supports our local economy.



#### **Scottsdale Parks Attitudes**




Nearly all open participation respondents are supportive of Scottsdale's parks and see value in them for both quality of life and the local economy.

# **Overall Visit Frequency**




Two-thirds of Scottsdale voters report visiting a park or other facility at least monthly, and just under half report visiting one at least once week a week.

#### Visit Frequency by Subgroups




Voters in the southern part of the city and younger voters use parks more frequently than other groups.


#### Values Around Parks and Taxes



In keeping with their positive views of the value of parks and open spaces, most voters agree that they are important to maintain with taxes. However, fewer trust the City to spend tax dollars responsibly, showing some tax sensitivity.

It is important to keep Scottsdale's parks and the Preserve safe, clean, and well-maintained, even if it means paying taxes.




#### Important to Fund Parks/Preserves by Subgroups

It is important to keep Scottsdale's parks and the Preserve safe, clean, and well-maintained, even if it means paying taxes.




#### Important to Fund Parks/Preserves by Subgroups



Frequent parks users are the most positive about financially supporting them.



#### Values Around Parks and Taxes



Most open participation respondents strongly agree that it is worth paying taxes to maintain Scottsdale's parks and facilities. Agreement is less intense on trust in the City, but the vast majority trust in the City's use of tax dollars.




#### **Perceived Need for Funds**

Intensity is low on both ends of the spectrum.



Belief that there is a need for more funding is generally positive, but varies across different demographic facets.



# Perceived Need for Funds by Subgroups



Those who visit Scottsdale open spaces and parks weekly are most likely to believe the city needs more funding for these facilities. Those who visit less than monthly are more likely to believe there is little to no need for additional funding.





#### Perceived Need for Funds



Almost two-thirds of open participation respondents believe the City needs funding for their parks and recreational sites and facilities. Intensity is low on both ends of the spectrum, similar to voters' sentiments.




# Open Spaces and Parks Priorities

#### Ratings – McDowell Sonoran Preserve




Voters feel positive about the condition of the Preserve. While fire protection and public safety are rated highly overall, intensity is lower than for the conditions of trails and trailheads and the Preserve's overall condition.



#### Ratings – McDowell Sonoran Preserve




Open participation respondents are positive about the condition of the Preserve overall. Two-fifths express uncertainty about the fire protections currently in place in the Preserve.



#### Ratings – City Parks and Other Facilities




The conditions of Indian Bend Wash Greenbelt and WestWorld are rated positively, though with lower positive intensity than other items tested.



## Ratings – City Parks and Other Facilities




Walking and biking paths are the most intensely positively rated of the city park facilities among open participation respondents. More than eight-in-ten say the overall condition of the City's parks is positive.



#### Priorities – McDowell Sonoran Preserve



While all have similar total priority ratings, improvements specific to ecological and fire prevention efforts are more likely to be a very high priority among voters than maintaining the Preserve overall.





#### **Priorities – McDowell Sonoran Preserve**



Maintaining the preserve is a priority for most open participation respondents. The specific projects with the highest intensity include protecting archeological sites and increasing fire prevention.





# **Priorities – City Parks and Other Facilities**



Improving City parks in the worst condition and ecological and public safety improvement efforts are among the highest rated priorities among voters. WestWorld and wildlife education programs have the lowest intensity and overall priority rating.





# **Priorities – City Parks and Other Facilities**



Protecting nature and wildlife is a very high priority for more than half of open participation respondents. Like voters, WestWorld and wildlife education programs have the lowest intensity and overall priority rating for this group.

# **Funding Mechanism Caveats**



- The final section of the survey was designed to provide information on how voters react to the questions being considered by the City and Task Force around potential funding mechanisms.
- It is important to bear in mind that the questions asked were not directly designed to measure the potential feasibility of any specific approach or potential measure.
- The results of the questions in this section should be taken in context of the rest of the survey as a potential indication of how interested Scottsdale voters may be in a solution to the City's funding challenges around parks and the Preserve, but should not be used to project anything specific about potential revenue measure feasibility.


#### **Funding Maintenance and Improvements Consideration**



An overwhelming super-majority of Scottsdale voters believe funding Scottsdale parks and recreation facilities without increasing the tax rate is a good idea, with about two-thirds responding that it would be a very good idea.

The City of Scottsdale is facing a shortfall in the funding needed to maintain and improve the McDowell Sonoran Preserve and other city parks and recreation facilities and is looking for ways to fund those needs.

If the City found a way to fund maintenance and improvements to the Preserve and other city parks and recreation facilities without increasing the tax rate, would you say this is a very good idea, a somewhat good idea, a somewhat bad idea, or a very bad idea?




## **Replacing Expiring Tax Consideration**



Once faced with the idea of adopting a new tax for maintenance and improvement to replace the expiring tax, a majority still say that it would be a "good idea," though the proportion indicating it is a very good idea decreases.

As you may know, voters in the City of Scottsdale approved two taxes for land purchases and access improvements for the McDowell Sonoran Preserve, the first of which is set to expire next year. The City may consider replacing this expiring tax with a new tax for the same amount to fund maintenance and improvements to the Preserve and other parks and recreation facilities.


# **Expanding Allowable Uses Consideration**



Scottsdale voters similarly believe it is a good idea to expand the allowable uses for the second tax that has yet to expire, yet overall voters saying it is a good idea continue to drop and negativity increases.

The second tax for the McDowell Sonoran Preserve is not expiring yet, but it currently can only be used for land purchases and limited improvements for the Preserve. In addition to the replacement tax I just told you about, the City is considering whether to expand the allowable uses for the funds from this second tax to include maintenance and improvements to the Preserve and other parks and recreation facilities.




#### **Final Consideration**



After hearing about both potential funding mechanisms, voters continue to overwhelmingly believe it is a good idea to fund City's parks and recreational spaces without increasing the tax rate, but intensity decreases after they learn more.



### Final Consideration by Subgroups




Voters who say they distrust the city to spend taxes responsibly show less intense positivity towards the potential funding mechanisms and more negativity overall.

After hearing about both potential funding mechanisms, voters across demographics are largely enthusiastic.




#### **Funding Maintenance and Improvements Consideration**



Nearly three quarters of open participation respondents are very supportive of the idea of funding maintenance for the Preserve and other city recreation facilities.

The City of Scottsdale is facing a shortfall in the funding needed to maintain and improve the McDowell Sonoran Preserve and other city parks and recreation facilities and is looking for ways to fund those needs.


# **Replacing Expiring Tax Consideration**



A majority of open participation survey still say that it would be a "good idea" to fund maintenance through a new tax, but those saying it is a bad idea increases and positive intensity drops considerably.

As you may know, voters in the City of Scottsdale approved two taxes for land purchases and access improvements for the McDowell Sonoran Preserve, the first of which is set to expire next year. The City may consider replacing this expiring tax with a new tax for the same amount to fund maintenance and improvements to the Preserve and other parks and recreation facilities.


# **Expanding Allowable Uses Consideration**



Once given more information about expanding the uses for the existing, non-expiring, tax, open participation respondents continue to display more negativity, though a majority still indicate it is a good idea overall.

The second tax for the McDowell Sonoran Preserve is not expiring yet, but it currently can only be used for land purchases and limited improvements for the Preserve. In addition to the replacement tax I just told you about, the City is considering whether to expand the allowable uses for the funds from this second tax to include maintenance and improvements to the Preserve and other parks and recreation facilities.




#### **Final Consideration**



While both potential funding mechanisms are viewed positively by open participation respondents, intensity decreases after they are given more information.



#### **Final Consideration**



Both survey groups show similar changes in opinion when given additional information.



#### Conclusions



- Both voters and the residents who responded to the open participation research see City parks and the McDowell Sonoran Preserve as contributors to Scottsdale's quality of life, and recognize the value of investing in open space and parks facilities.
- Both groups understand the need for funding to maintain, improve, and operate parks and recreational sites and facilities and express a willingness to fund parks and the Preserve through tax dollars.
- While enthusiasm declines when voters and residents hear more details about the specifics of possible funding mechanisms for parks and the Preserve, both groups endorse the idea of funding maintenance and improvements without raising taxes.



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

# **Scottsdale Parks Ratings**




Scottsdale parks and recreational spaces receive positive ratings; however, intensity is low with statements with highest ratings are viewed as excellent by about a third of voters.



# **Scottsdale Parks Ratings**




The second tier of statements are viewed as excellent by about a fourth of voters, while total positive rating is similar to the highest statements. Public safety in the Preserve and the overall condition of the Indian Bend Wash Greenbelt and Westworld have the lowest intensity.

Ecological and fire improvement efforts across the City's parks and the Preserve are among the highest rated priorities.




