- · How can Scottsdale Parks & Recreation better communicate with residents with neuro or physical diversities and their families/caretakers?

REPORT SUMMARY

DISCUSSION NOTE: 24 participants responded to this activity. Demographics for this activity can be found in the appendix of this report. This was a small sample size and may not be representative of a larger, more diverse audience. Initial thoughts based on the small sample size for this activity are not conclusive and should be further explored/validated.

Many participants mentioned being unfamiliar with Scottsdale Adaptive Service programs because they were not services they currently needed and couldn't speak to programs, building amenities, or events and programs. But overall, participants shared appreciation for these types of services and felt they are important for communities.

Some recommendations provided by participants included improvements to walking paths and trails, such as shade, seating, and improved wayfinding, and social events/opportunities for the aging population. One participant referenced the Fairfax County, VA adaptive service program as a robust program they were familiar with.
